Intemperance indeed may seem a thing with which they should not for one mo-ment be associated.—but this can apply only to the practice, not to the correction of it. assist putting down an evil which has ruined so many of their own sex—which has destroyed the peace and the comfort of so many families which has made so many wives widows, and so many children orphans—which is the parent of every vice, and of every crime—which has spread through our land disease, insanity and death and which has involved and is involving, such multitudes of immortal beings in everlasting ruin—this surely is an object which should awake the sensibilities of every female mind this is an object which it well befits their characthe to advocate—this is an object in behalf of which they may, without a blush, make the most zealous and energetic exertions. Their exertions in behalf of many other benevolent

designs have been crowned with signal success; and there is no institution of which they are more likely to be more winning and more successful advocates with the other sex than the Temperance Society. If this opinion be correct, let all the females of our land consider the amount of guilt which will attach to them, if they stand back in this great and good cause.—Temperance Almanack.

MISCELLANEA.

Bishop of Norwich.—Those who have not looked at the statistics of crime, can have no conception of the enormous influence of intoxication on the lower orders. It surpasses all belief. I will not go far into details, for it would occupy too long; but I will just give you one brief instance. We have, I believe, in Great Britain, England, Scotland, and Ireland, in round numbers, about twenty-three millions of people. There is annually consumed by this population thirty-one millions of gallons of spirits. What is the cost for bread for this community? twenty-five millions per annum. What is the cost for spirits, exclusive of wines and malt liquors? It has been said to amount to above forty millions per annum! Forty millions are expended, the greater part unnecessarily and injuriously, in intoxicating drinks by the community of this great land: we might almost say, when we compare the consumption of bread to that of spirit, "a ha'p'orth of bread to all this sack." Perhaps the best way to impress on the mind the quantity of spirits drunk in this country is the following singular illustration. On a calculation I lately saw, the whole consumption would form a river 100 miles in length, three feet in depth, and nearly thirty in width. This would surpass belief; but so it appears on the authority of some who have investigated the fact. It is like the fabled river of Acheron, a river of death. You find amongst those who are plunged in it, gliding downwards towards the ocean of eternity, no strugglings after immortality, no eye looking to that hereafter to which it leads. "The dead that go down on that river praise not the Lord. It is not the stream that hasteneth downwards to make glad the city of God."

THE TWO EXTREMES—TEETOTALISM AND DRUNKENNESS.—At the Uxbridge Petty Sessions, which were held before Sir W. Wiseman, Bart., J. Clark, and J. Dagnall, Esqs., for the appointment of headboroughs, constables, &c., for the Uxbridge district, two rather curious objections were made by two persons named Emmerton and Wingrove, who had been nominated to fill the office of headboroughs. Mr. Emmerton's objection to serve was on the ground of his being a Teetotaller, and he stated that as his duties would frequently compel him to enter public-houses, he would therefore "beg to be excused." The objection of Mr. Wingrove was, at least, a very candid one. It was on the ground "that he was a drunkard," which rendered him unfit to hold the office. Both of these objections were held to be "good."

A DRUNKEN MADMAN.—On Sunday morning, about three o'clock, a man of the name of Samuel Smith, while intoxicated, strode his way into the yard adjoining Palmer the tinnan's. opposite Carter's Barracks, and forced himself into the well, which was about thirty feet deep, and contained about seventeen feet of water at the time, and immediately began to shout in a stentorian tone for assistance. Higgins and Morris, two of the police, hearing the cries, went and rescued him; on examining the well it appeared he must have taken considerable pains to get into it, as it was properly curbed and had a windlass and bucket over it. Smith paid five shillings on Monday for the benefit of the poor, and was discharged.

Mrs. S. was a good deal injured, but soon after was removed to her own house. The accident arose from the negligence or ignorance of Mr. Maclzer's stable-helper, (a lad), who had harnessed the animal to the shafts, before putting on the head gear or reins.
