### PATRIOTIC ASSOCIATION.

**THE** MEMBERS of the PATRIOTIC ASSOCIATION, are requested to meet at the "Pulteney Hotel," on TUESDAY, the 30th inst., to take into consideration the retirement from Parliament of our late Parliamentary Advocate, H. L. Bulwer, Esq., with reference to our obtaining an advocate in his room; also the changes which it is generally believed will be accomplished by the contemplated Act of Parliament for the better government of these Colonies; and other purposes of general business.  
The subject which it is proposed shall be last considered by the Meeting, either on the day above-mentioned, or by an adjournment to the next day, is, the projected change in the assignment in this Colony of transported offenders. This is not a party question, nor one in which the Patriotic Association is exclusively concerned; but on the contrary, it is a question of general interest, and therefore interests both the great political parties which agitate the Colony at the present time. Individuals of both these parties, are therefore invited, to meet each other on this occasion, in order to provide, in the best manner they may, for their mutual interests; interests compared with which none can be greater; and compared with which none so great, have ever before been under the consideration of Her Majesty's Government. It is proposed to address the Secretary of State on the subject, and more particularly to explain the nature of the evidence given before the late Committee on Transportation respecting the assignment in this Colony of offenders; and to set forth the evils of associating offenders together in masses, in lieu of (as at present) humanizing them by separation in small bodies among the Settlers of the Colony. For by associating them in masses, these men will be cut off from domestic life; and it must be anticipated, that after their terms of servitude shall have expired, they will be so depraved, so lost to all patriotic feelings, and christian-like habits, as to render it imperative on the Colonists at large to remonstrate with the Home Government against their being allowed to remain in the Colony. Fifty years' experience has shown, that, abating about a tenth portion, transported offenders have made little or no improvement, as their terms of servitude shall have expired, they will be so depraved, so lost to all patriotic feelings, and christian-like habits, as to render it imperative on the Colonists at large to remonstrate with the Home Government against their being allowed to remain in the Colony. Fifty years' experience has shown, that, abating about a tenth portion, transported offenders have made little or no improvement, as their terms of servitude shall have expired, they will be so depraved, so lost to all patriotic feelings, and christian-like habits, as to render it imperative on the Colonists at large to remonstrate with the Home Government against their being allowed to remain in the Colony.
