IMPORTANT DECISION .- On Saturday Mr. Timothy Maher again appeared before the Bench at the Sydney Police Office, upon the summons obtained against him by Mr. Edwin Parke; under the following circumstances:—Mr. Parke, a few days since, was in the counting house of Messrs. Gore & Co. where he transacts his business, and talking with a settler relative to the purchase of wool; at this moment Maher entered, and called the party talking to Mr. Parke on one side; Mr. P. was irritated, and called Mr. M. a blackguard, with a few other choice terms, ordered him to quit the office; he refused, when Mr. Parke said that he would kick him out, and putting his hard to his choulder. him out, and putting his hand to his shoulder as an earnest of his intention, Mr. Maher walked out. Two or three days afterwards they met in the street, Mr. Maher being upon horseback, who raising a stick he held in his hand, shook it at Mr. Parke, using threatening language. A summons was issued at the instance of Mr. Parke for this tendency to a breach of the peace, to answer which Mr. Maher appeared at the Office, when Mr. Parke suggested that Mr. M. was a prisoner of the Crown, and therefore was not to prisoner of the Crown, and therefore was not to be dealt with as a free man. The Bench, consisting of Messrs. Windeyer, Young and M'Queen, appeared to have their doubts as to the force of the document produced, and treated Mr. Maher as a prisoner, by ordering him into custody; he was subsequently permitted to give bail, and allowed to go at large pending the final decision of the following day. On Saturday Mr. Maher, attended by Barristers S. Stephen and R. Windeyer, and Solicitors C. H. Chambers and Thurdeyer, and Solicitors C. H. Chambers and Thurlow, appeared before the Bench, consisting of Messrs. Windeyer, Young, Gisborne, McQueen and Edye Manning.—Mr. S. Stephen contended that his client, then at the bar, should be removed from thence to the floor of the Court, and

moved from thence to the floor of the Court, and treated in every respect as a free man. The Bench wished Mr. S. to show the grounds of his request. Mr. S. contended that Maher, having the Governor's letter, was to all intents and purposes a free man in the Colony: there were numerous instances in which the Bench held these letters to amount to a pardon, and parties holding them had suced and beast and in the Supreme Court without any objection being made.
