ADVERTISEMENT.

AT a PUBLIC MEETING held at the Police Office Brisbane Water, for providing the means of erecting a Church, &c. the following Resolutions were proposed:—

1.—Moved by Mr. Donnison, and seconded by Mr. Bean—"That the population of the District of Brisbane Water is such, as to make the provision of some public means of religious instruction highly desirable; but, that owing to its scattered nature, one Church will be insufficient. It is therefore desirable to select different sites, whereon to erect two Churches of the communion of the Church of England, and that two separate subscriptions be immediately set on foot, for the collection of funds for defraying the expenses of the same.

2.—Moved by Mr. Hely, and seconded by Mr. Watson—"That His Lordship the Bishop of Australia, having stated, that the provision of a Dwelling House will be a necessary preliminary to his appointment of a Clergyman to reside in the District, a separate subscription be also set on foot for the purpose of erecting a Parsonage.

3.—Moved by Mr. Moore, and seconded by Mr. Scott—"That the site of the Parsonage shall be chosen by the subscribers to the two Churches, in a public meeting to be held at the Police Office on the same day, to be appointed by the Committee, of which there shall be fourteen days notice.

4.—Moved by Mr. Hely, and seconded by Mr. Moore—"That the following gentlemen be requested to act as a Provisional Committee:—Mr. Donnison, Mr. Hely, Mr. Bean, Mr. Watson, and Mr. Henderson, and that they may be requested to procure subscriptions for the proposed object.

5.—Moved by Mr. Scott, and seconded by Mr. Donnison—"That it is desirable that one of the Churches be erected on Point Frederick, and the other on the vacant Crown Lands, near Green Point or Kingcumber.

6.—Moved by Mr. Watson, and seconded by Mr. Moore—"That the following gentlemen be requested to aid the Committee, in furthering the objects of these Resolutions:—Mr. Mann, Mr. McQuoid, Mr. Manning, Mr. Townsends, Major Smith, and Mr. W. T. Cape.

7.—Moved by Mr. Donnison, and seconded by Mr. Scott—"That persons subscribing one pound and upwards be entitled to vote at all public meetings; those subscribing five pounds to have two votes.

8.—Moved by Mr. Bean, and seconded by Mr. Hely—"That persons non-resident or detained by illness, be allowed to vote by proxy at all public meetings. All proxies to be in writing.

9.—Moved by Mr. Moore, and seconded by Mr. Donnison—"That a copy of these Resolutions be published once in each of the public newspapers.

Passed this 1st day of February, 1838.

It was then moved by Mr. Hely, and seconded by Mr. Bean—"That Mr. Holden should vacate the Chair, and that Mr. Moore should take it. Moved by Mr. Donnison, and seconded by Mr. Bean—"That the thanks of the Meeting be given to Mr. Holden, for his able conduct in the Chair.—Carried unanimously.
