



MERCHANT SEAMEN .- The laws relating to Merchant Seamen in this Port, are either grossly defective or misconstrued in the administration The following case is about as rare a specimen of this as we could adduce. Charles Henry Webb articled seaman of the brig Bec, was brought before the Bench on a warrant, charged with desertion: Captain John Joseph Hunte commanding the brig Bee deposed, that defendant had signed articles as a seaman in January lust for six months, the vessel making coasting voyages; the Chief Officer stated that on Tu week last, the defendant left the vessel without leave; he returned the following day about ten o'clock, when he informed him that he had hired another man in his room, meaning that he had hired a man as a labourer for that day only; defendant said very well, he was just coming to tell them to get one and again went away. He was subsequently found after a long search, on board the Currency Lass in which vessel he had shipped, received the advance and removed his clothes on board from the Bee. The Bench told the man to go on board the vessel, appearing of opinion that the hiring a labourer in his room cancelled the desertion. Mr. Egan, the owner of the Bee wished to know if that was all the re dress for the expense and loss of time been put to, to which it was responded, that the Bench had nothing to do with any expense he had incurred, the man must return to his vessel According to our opinion upon the subject, a clearer case of desertion never was made out and that the man should have undergone the utmost penalty imposed by law for desertion. #### THE THEATRE

On Saturday night was repeated the domestic Comedy of "Married Life," and although this piece has been performed various times, of the dramatis personæ appeared to know but little of their parts. This is unpardonable. The afterpiece was "Maurice the Woodcutter," which went off just passably, and that was all.

Mr. Stanton as Riegel, the jailor, astonished us more than usual, he will undoubtedly be the founder of a new school of acting, the pupils of which, with a very good grace, can take the name of Stantonians, while the peculiar merits of the style when seen in any actor, will be immediately recognised and appellated Stantonianism. Harlequinade in the delivery of solemn and impressive passages, is the peculiar trait of this school. There was one circumstance which came under our review on Saturday evening, the omission to notice which, we should consider a gross deriliction of our duty to the public—we allude to two or three persons having been ad-mitted into the pit for the express purpose of hissing Mr. Munyard, and they attempted to execute their orders, but fortunately for the character of the audience, these parties, who could render themselves subservient to such base and unworthy purposes, were within a shade of being soundly kicked for their pains. We could also see a fugleman upon the boards in the last piece, who occasionally "gave the office,' as it is called, and then an attempt at hissing commenced. We tell these parties, that they bite against a file in attempting to put down this gentlemen, because, forsooth, he possesse talent, with which they cannot compete. 'Married Life," how came the curtain in the first act to fall in the middle of Mr. Munyard's last speech, and why, when the prompter though necessary to aid him, was it in a voice within a note of the actor's? These annoyances cannot escape the notice of the Manager, and if he has any respect for the situation he holds, and wishes a declining establishment to breathe a little longer, he would act with that firmness httle longer, he would act with that hranness which would soon quench this hostile and malignant feeling. Such proceedings, however, cannot escape our view, and we shall do our duty, although we find others to be so relax in theirs. The orchestra had been strengthened by an additional French horn and a violin—it was consequently more effective.

We never felt more disgusted than in witnessing the blackguard and disgraceful scenes which occurred in the Sydney Theatre on Monday night. The Play was the Drama of the 'Charcoal Burner," and the first time of its representation here: we shall reserve our stric-tures upon the piece and its performance until our next--neither time nor inclination allowing us to go into it at present. The Drama was permitted to go off without any disturbance, and Mr. Fitzgerald's Hornpipe which followed re ceived a vociferous encore. The curtain then rose for Othello Travestie, but upon Mr. Munyard making his appearance as Michael Cassio, a yell was raised, unequalled by any thing we ever heard at that Theatre; the shouts, yells, and blackguard imprecations still continued, when Mr. Lazar came forward, and wished to know the cause of their disapprobation: a strange looking mortal raised himself upon one of the pit seats, and replied, that as how Mr. Levy (the Prompter) had shewn them a letter written by Mr. Munyard, in which he called the Colony a country of thieves and ragabonds; Mr. Lazar said that he knew nothing relative to the cause of complaint, but that he gave Mr. Munyard permission to explain if he thought proper. Mr. M. then advanced to the footlights, and said, that the latter fairly high the cause of the continuous control of the contro that the letter of which they spoke, he knew no-thing; if he had given offence to any one then in the Theatre, he apologised. This apology, which is sufficient to be made by any man under any circumstance, was not conceived by those bent upon a riot as sufficient, but it was toler ably clear that the disturbers were misguided and had been prompted to create this uproar .-After the ample apology given by Mr. M. the noise increased rather than diminished, com bined with such encouraging observations as "give it him, Lee"—"pitch into him, Dyball;" "knock him down, Lazar," &c. &c.
