

May it please-your Excellencythe Australian Subscription Library, has been appointed to wait upon your Excellency, to so licit that you will confer honor upon that insti-

tution by accepting the office of its patron.

Reflecting how early in life your Excellency and myself were associated in the study of literature, I am more than ordinarily gratified that after the lapse of so many years it should have fallen to my lot, by a rare coincidence, to bespeak your influences and good offices, in sup-port of an establishment designed at once to foster a taste for intellectual pursuits, and to afford facilities for its gratification.

The Australian Library being of comparatively recent formation has not yet attained in any one department to that completeness which casatisfy the reasonable expectations of the scho lar, or enable the student to follow up his enquiries to the existing boundaries of learning and science. But on behalf of this incipient collection, we venture to express a hope, that through the favorable impulse communicated by your Excellency's patronage, our accumulation of the productions of literature may receive such augmentation as to enable it, at no distant time, to bear some comparison with those mag-nificent depositories, which are the boast and rnament of the chief cities in Europe.

We make our present solicitation with greater confidence, informed as we are of your Excel-lency's predilection for literary and scientific pursuits, and of the successful attention which you have devoted to them. At the same time we are confident that we shall not be regarded as soliciting any thing unsuitable to the exalted station of your Excellency, when it is considered that the most enlightened Kings and Statesmen have taken pride in connecting their names with the institution and support of public libraries; deeming this to be one of the most legitimate modes of exercising that influence for provement of the communities over which they

We, the Ministers and Elders of the Synod of New South Wales, beg leave most respectfully to approach Your Excellency, to express our sincere congratulations on Your Excellency's safe arrival in this Colony, as also on Your Excellency's auspicious assumpsion of its Govern-ment under the benign sway of our most gracious Sovereign,

Having been already entrusted by his late Majesty with a high and responsible Commission in one of the other Colonies of this vast Empire, and having fulfilled the important duties of that Commission so as to merit the unqualified approbation of his Majesty's Government. ment, Your Excellency has arrived in this Colony possessed of that intimate knowledge and matured experience, in regard to the habits and feelings, the interests and prospects of the Colonies generally, which are so peculiarly desira-ble in the Governor of this remote but im-portant dependency of the British Crown; and it is therefore with entire confidence, as well as with sincere pleasure, that, in humble depen-dence on the blessing of Almighty God, we look forward to the rapid advancement of our adopted country, not only in agriculture, in convent country, not only in agriculture, in commerce, and in population, but in general intelligence, in morality, and in religion, under Your Excel-lency's administration.

we beg leave to assure rour excellency of our cordial, though humble co-operation in promoting the peace, good order, and prosperity of the Colony; and while carnestly endeavouring to teach the people committed to our pastoral care the doctrines and duties of our holy religion, we pledge ourselves zealously to inculcate upon them loyalty to our most gracious Sover-cign, respect for Your Excellency, and obedience to the laws of the land.

As this is the first opportunity which the Synod of New South Wales have had of approaching the Representative of Her Mujesty the proaching the Representative of rier majesty ino Queen, we beg to inform Your Excellency that, sincerely and conscientiously attached to the doctrine, discipline, and worship of the Church of Scotland—to which we belong, and to promote the influence and observance of the hallowed institutions of which we have been sent forth, under the sanction of Her Majesty's go. vernment, to this distant territory—it shall ever verment, to this distance into y at small ever be our object and desire to transmit that doc-trine, discipline, and worship pure and entire to the latest posterity in this land of our adoption, We beg leave at the same time to apprise Your Excellency that the Synod already conprises four Presbyteries, or subordinate Courts of Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, and that it has under its inspection twelve ordained Ministers and Licentiates; several students of theology, of whom one is at present under examinations for license to preach the gospel; fifteen catechists, both male and female; and fifteen schoolmasters; and that during the last three months it has established ten schools and has five others in

That Your Excellency may be guided in all your measures by that "wisdom which cometh from above," and that those measures may prove uniformly conducive to the promotion of that "righteousness which exalteth a nation," is our sincere desire, and shall ever be our earnest
