Lord Bacon Sydney Police Office.

We call the serious attention of His Excellency Sir George Gipps, to the gross neglect which has been manifested for up wards of a week past to the interests of the public. From some cause, of which we are not aware, Colonel Wilson has been absent from his duties for some days and the result has been, that the time of the public has been most recklessly wasted. The Colonel's hour for commencing the police business, is half-past eight o'clock, on the free side of the Court; this has been the system for a sudden however, the Colonel ceases his attendance in toto, and as Mr. Windeyer never attends till ten o'clock, prosecutors, witnesses &c, are kept cooling their heels in the Police Office yard, for one hour and a-half, hustled and jostled about by the constabulary, who upon such occa ions show off the little brief authority they possess. The hour set apart for commencing business at the Police Office, has no right to be altered under any circumstances, without public notice being given through the Government Gazette, or other-

wise. The costly charge of £11,000 per

annum is paid for the support of the Syn-

NEY Police alone, which sum comes out of the public pocket. It is a RIGHT, that the then has fully commenced for the day, and parties are obliged to leave matters of serious moment, to appear against their disorderly assigned servants, or have them taken from them. It is absurd to talk of the convenience of the Magistrates by allowing an extra hour in bed of a morning; they are the paid servants of the public, their time consequently belongs to that public. If either of the Police Magistrates are ill, absent or otherwise, nothing is more difficult than to procure the attendance of an honorary Magistrate; this is not quite correct; if gentlemen are pleased with J.P. appended to their names, they might occasionally, and it is but seldom they are asked, devote an

hour or two to public business.
