

### ADDRESS.

The following Address was presented to His Excellency the Governor at Government House, Sydney, on Friday, the 20th April instant, namely :—

May it please your Excellency,-

The President and Committee of the Dispensary take the liberty to congratulate Your Excellency on your accession to the Administration of the Government of these Colonies, by the appointment of our Gracious Sovereign, and beg to express their fervent hope that under Your Excellency's auspices this country will advance in moral and religious improvement, with the same unexampled success which has characterised the Administration of Your Excellency's

The Sydney Dispensary has existed for more than ten years, but it has only of late taken a prominent position among the Benevolent Institutions of the Colony. From a perusal of the reports for the last three years, already furnished to Your Excellency, they believe the progress of this Institution will be seen to advantage.

The Dispensary was instituted, and is maintained for the relief of persons requiring medical advice and aid, but who are unable to pay for them, and whose establishments would be broken up, their families dispersed or involved in misery and wretchedness, by entering an Hospital or an Asylum. The Dispensary affords advice and medicine at the Institution, and at their own homes, to persons labouring under disease; and as this town abounds with persons in the lower walks of life, not remarkable for habits of temperance or prudence, and with poor but industrious persons of long standing in the Colony, or recently arrived, who cannot provide means to resist the unforseen ravages of disease and accidental misfortune, it is consolatory to know that an Institution exists calculated the one and alleviate the other; while it is creditable to the inhabitants of this place that they have contributed sufficient funds to meet current expenses, and to aid in the crection of a proposed

edifice for a permanent Dispensary. The ravages of disease, and the growth of incipient distemper and pestilence are rapid and ingerous when relief is not afforded; and Your Excellency must feel a lively interest in the prosperity of every Institution having their re-moval for its objects. The Dispensary being conducted on the most economical principles, consistent with perfect efficiency, it is hoped that Your Excellency's public as well as private inclinations will be gratified by complying with the unanimous request of the Committee, that Your Excellency would be graciously pleased to become Patron of this Institution, thus re-commending by Your Excellency's kind ex-ample the cause of the afflicted and the destitute, the victims of their own imprudence, and the subjects of the visitation of providence.

HIS EXCELLENCY'S REPLY.

Gentlemen,-I have great pleasure in complying with the request which you have done me the honor to prefer to me, and I beg to assure you, that in placing myself in the position with respect to the Sydney Dispensary, which was lately oc-cupied by Sir Richard Bourke, it is my desire to follow the course that he adopted, and to

give it all the support in my power. Few things are of more importance to a young ommunity than an early attention to the Inscicommunity than an early attention to the insti-tutions of Benevolence, and to the principles on which they ought to be conducted; as a general rule, nothing can I believe be laid down more safely than that they are best managed by Committees, elected by the Subscribers out of their own body, a rule of which I am happy to find you have adopted, and which certainly is well justified by the rapid progress which your successive Annual Reports prove your Institu-

tion to be making.

Extensive endowments, whether given by the State, or derived from the manificence of individuals, are rarely managed with economy; and an indifference to waste is but too prevalent. even where the entire funds for any purpose whatsoever are annually supplied from the public purse. In an economical point of view, it is even therefore desirable that the support and management of such institutions sh principally devolve on the inhabitants of the listricts, for whose benefit they are intended; can never be of that doubly-blessed nature which, like mercy, blesseth him who gives, no

less than him who takes. Destined, Gentlemen, as Sydney is, at no distant date, to take rank amongst the first com-mercial cities of the world, the demand for insti-tutions of benevolence will be daily increasing. as well as for other institutions which prepare men to take the management of their affairs into their own hands, and to relieve the Government from the necessity of interference in local concerns, which ought not properly to come under its cognizance. These demands will, I have no doubt, be as readily met by the Public as they will be acquiesced in by the Government.

For the kind expressions, Gentlemen, which you have addressed to me personally, I beg very sincerely to thank you; and I join most cordially with you in the hope, that, under my administration, your country may continue to advance, as it has already done under my prede-

On the night of the day laid in the information, deceased called at the hut where prisoner and other men belonging to Mr. Hassal lived: two gallons of rum wer cured from a store in the vicinity, kept by a person named Walton, upon which the whole of hem became somewhat intoxicated.
