

THE BUSHRANGERS .- On Thursday evening, three armed men went to Mr. Kemp's hut, Sorell Lake, knocked at the door, and demanded admittance. The door being immediately opened, they presented their pistols to the men inside, threatening if they stirred one moment they would blow their brains out. They next handcuffed them, and proceeded to search the house. They stayed till 3 o'clock the next day, during which time they amused themselves by an exhibition of their expertness in the use of their arms, in firing at a target 150 paces distant. At 3 o'clock, they ordered Mr. Kemp's servants to get two horses ready to carry provisions which they plundered from the house, viz. 190 lbs. of flour 21 lbs. sugar, 4 lbs. tea, besides sundry slops. They then proceeded with the men and horses to the back of Cradle Mountain. At the Tea tree Brush they met two men with arms, when two of the bushrangers called out, "These are two traps—let us overhaul them"—a purpose which they immediately accomplished. The nen, who were constables, on seeing the bush men, who were constables, on seeing the bush rangers, endeavoured to escape (they did not, as represented by the Courier, fire), but finding the hopelessness of their effort, they finally yielded themselves up. The latter took from the constables their fire-arms, placing them in the hollow of a tree, and having hand-cussed them, compelled them to go upon their knees in the water up to their middle, and beg for their lives.
