THE THIRD POLICE MAGISTRATE.

The gentleman, who fills the important and responsible situation of Third Police Magistrate, it cannot be unknown to our readers, is Mr. Ryan Brenan, Coroner, Attorney at Law, &c. &c. That the duties which devolve upon the gentleman holding this office are onerous, cannot be denied and from the division of magisterial duties at the Sydney Police, it is peculiarly a situation which can be made use of, either to rward the views of the community, or to treat their wishes with contempt. We refer, to the Third Police Magistrate invariably taking that portion of the duties relating to the prison population. While Colonel Wilson is almost constantly in attendance on the free side of the office at half-past eight o clock, when he disposes of the drunken cases, and commences the more official duties of the office at nine o'clock, Mr Ryan Brenau cannot condescend to fire any earlier hour than ten o'clock, which is as frequently eleven or twelve, and sometimes even later than that hour. What is the result? the First and Second Police Magistrates being engaged in the free Court, that portion of the inhabitants who have charges against assigned servants, and which generally amount with witnesses to something considerable, are forced to wait outside

the doors, wet or dry-for they are not permitted to enter the sacred precincts of the Court until his worship is enthroned—from ten o'clock, the established time of opening, until the Court is actually opened, which, as we have before stated, may be after twelve o'clock. To compel a person to leave his business at 10 o'clock, to prosecute his unruly servant, is bad enough, when the lateness of the hour is taken into consideration, but how is the evil aggrevated and increased when the greater part of the day is lost, owing to the negligence of the Magistrate; for if the master is worn out by being jostled about by the fellows called constables, or business perhaps calls upon him to return home he loses his servant, who is turned into Government, in consequence of the contempt!!! A precious doctrine truly; but such is the fact. That the convenience of the inhabitants of this town, would be best consulted by His Excellency ordering that the prisoner's should open at the same time as the free Court, is without doubt, and we consider him imperatively called upon so to do. These continued and reiterat d complaints were never so rife in the time of Messrs. Gisborne and Young, both gentlemen who had gained the full confidence of the public by their " sauviter in modo, fortiter in re," and who, also upon the score of talent and ability, leave Mr. Ryan Brenan lamentably in the back ground. These gentlemen had no sooner become au fait in their duties, than they were compelled from circumstances to leave. What gentleman would hold the situation with the present paltry stipend for a remuneration? None who felt it necessary to support the dignity of the office. But it so happens that Mr. Brenan is a very fortunate man; ever since his arrival in the Colony good luck has attended him, situation after situation has been bestowed upon him with unsparing hand, while modest merit has had to put up with the proud man's contumely. The situation of Third Police Magistrate should be well paid, but the party holding the office should not be a pluralist, if he is, some one of the offices must be badly conducted, and it should be also imperative upon him to open the Court at nine o'clock, and every time he neglected this essential to the comforts of the inhabitants, let him be fined or fine himself, as that patriotic, upright and independent Judge, Burton, so nobly set the example in his own person.

We are not at all astonished to observe in the last number of such a nery questionable Journal, as to respectability, as the Sydney Gazette, an article headed "The Chief Constable," setting forth that the " worthless part of the commu nity," perhaps they mean themselves, were loud eir complaints of Mr. Mitchell's and injustice. All we hear of Mr. Mitchell is unquestionably in his praise. The thick skulled writers in the Gazette forget that all informations brought to the Chief Constable he is obliged to file without respect of persons; this was neve complained of by any one, but the complain was of the wretched vermin who hunted up such informations. The sneer and contunely at-tempted to be heaped upon that very respect-able body of men, the Odd Fellows, will probably he felt at the termination of the quarter. If that clap-trap word so much in vogue in Bo tany Bay-Respectability-for no man ever thinks of alluding to that in the mother country in support of falsehoods—be considered as a compound of the most profound ignorance, with the malice of a fiend, the 'Sydney Gazette is just the Journal to look at for respectability, and none other that we know of in this Colony. Happily for the community, perhaps, the reign of such a mixture draws to a close, and

such parties may discover, what it is rather difficult to make men believe, that they are contemptible even in their own eyes.

On Tuesday James O'Brien Croker was at last publicly examined at the Police Office, and committed to take his trial for forging a reward ticket, by which the sum of five pounds was received. It was really amatter of surprise to us, that after so much secrecy and favoritism had been exhibited, in this case, that the young man was not discharged on the ground of his coming within the hallowed circle of Botany Bay Aristocracy. We do say, that had such a circumstance occurred, it would not have caused us the smallest surprise, knowing as we do the system, combined with the trickery and Star Chamber proceedings that al-ways go hand in hand, whenever, what is called respectability is brought on the tapis. And to this circumstance may be attributed the con temp; with which the Sydney Police is looked upon by people in the more humble walks of life, who are not so blind, but what they can discover, that under the present system, there is one law for them and another for those who are called respectable. They easily perceive that if they commit any offence, they are kicked that it they commit any offence, they are kicked and dragged about like dogs, thrust into the dock by the collar and spoken to, as though they were unworthy of being ranked in the scale of rational beings. On the other hand, any-thing in the shape of the silver fork school, is treated with the greatest respect, no matter how deep the offence, the most polite constable is appointed to wait upon him like a lacquey; when the examination comes on he is inducted into the Star Chamber, a chair presented and accepted, and should be feel low spirited, a glass of generous wine quickly causes a reaction. Verily these are precious times, when what is miscalled respectability, (which in this Colony appears to consist of the disability to take a glass of wine like a gentleman after dinner) has a premium actually held out to commit crime instead of the good sound principle of the greater the offender the greater the offence, being acted up to.

On Tuesday, a carter in a state of inebriety, can his cart foul of a dray and capsized his own vehicle—a constable coming up and seeing how matters stood, found it necessary to cut the traces before he could get the horse out of the entanglement, which he sent to the pound, while he conducted the driver to the watch house upon the road the fellow indecently exposed his rson. On Wednesday, when brought before the Police, he was very properly fined 5s. for being drunk, or three hours in the stocks, and £5 for the offence against decency, or a month

QUEEN'S BIRTH DAY.

Thursday was the anniversary of the birth day of our most gracious Sovereign Lady, Queen Victoria, being the first, since her ascension to the Throne of the British Empire. The day broke with unclouded splendour, and as the sun gilded the horizon it was aptly denominated the SUN OF VICTORIA. The Banks and Public Offices were closed, and many of the shops throughout the Town were shut up, and all classes of the com-munity appeared determined to enjoy themselves and celebrate with becoming splendour the auspicious event. At half-past eleven o'clock, the troops in garrison were marched, drums beat ing, and colors flying, to Hyde Park, where they were inspected by Colonel Snodgrass, C. B. commanding; having gone through sundry evolutions and fired a feu de joie, they returned to their quarters. At twelve o'clock, a Royal salute was fired from Dawes' Battery under the British Standard, which floated over the Ramparts.
