On Tuesday last, the Legislative Council met for the first time since the arrival of His Excellency Sir George Gipps, upon these shores, when he addressed them as will be found below. We think without any great exertion or stretch of liberality. the Clerk of the Council Mr. McPherson. might have forwarded to this office a copy of the same on the day it was delivered, coming out as we did the following morning we consider we had a prior claim to all other Journals, in fact a RIGHT to such courtesy. E. Deas Thomson, Esq., Colonial Secretary when holding the situation Mr. McPherson now fills, always was thus polite towards the Sydney Journals. We hope we shall not again have to complain of similar neglect.

VOTES AND PROCEEDINGS

Tuesday, 29 May, 1838.

1. Council met, pursuant to summons; His Excellency the Governor in the chair. The oath of allegiance to Her Majesty the Queen administered to the members present, viz.:— His Honor James Dowling, Esquire, Chief Justice of New South Wales; Colonel Kenneth Snodgrass, C. B., the Senior Officer in com-mand of Her Majesty's Land Forces; Edward Deas Thomson, Esquire, Colonial Secretary; John Hubert Plunkett, Esquire, Attorney-General; Lieutenant-Colonel George Nathaniel Gibbs, Collector of Customs; William Lithgow, Esquire, Auditor General; Alexander Berry, Esquire; Richard Jones, Esquire; John Blax-land, Esquire; Edward Charles Close, Esquire; Hannibal Hawkins Macarthur, Esquire; and Sir John Jamison, Knight.

2. His Excellency then read the following Address:—

GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL. -In meeting you for the first time, I am happy to be able to congratulate you on the general tranquility which reigns throughout the Colony and on the success with which the efforts of in dustry continue to be rewarded in this rising land.

It will be my first duty to lay before you communication from Her Majesty's Government, addressed to my predecessor, informing him of the reasons which have led to a further delay in bringing before Parliament the Bill for regulating the Constitution of this Colony, and the consequent necessity of renewing for a short time the Act of 9th Geo. IV, under which it has

peen governed for the last nine years. I shall have occasion (in the course of the present session, to bring under your consideration various measures, either for the renewal of Acts which are about to expire, or for effecting such amendments in the Law, as appear to be called for by the actual wants of the community. Some of these measures I will now briefly explain to

"The present "Jury Act" will expire on the 30th of the ensuing month, and I shall propose to renew it, though for the period only of two years, as it is a measure which I think ought again to be brought under consideration, as soon as the Legislature of the Colony shall have been established in its new form. The consitution of Juries is a matter of too much importtance to be regarded with indifference, by any person attached to the principles of the British Constitution, or who desires to see those principles applied, as far as circumstances will allow, in this

The "Act for facilitating the apprehension of transported felons, and offenders illegally at large," will expire on the 30th Semtember next; and though this is a law which I feel to be at varience wirh the general character of British institutions, I have the less reluctance in proposing the renewal of it, as I am informed that it has hitherto been carried into effect, with little inconvenience to persons of good repute, and because I believe it to be one which in the present state of our population is required for the security of life and property. I see it, however, essential that it should not be rendered permanent in order that its principles may undergo fre quent revision, and that it may be dispensed with at the earliest possible period that the circumstances of the Colony will permit.

I propose, on an early day, to lay before you two Bills for effecting an alteration in the law especting insolvent debtors. One will be calculated to give relief to insolvents, and to provide for the due administration of their estates; the other will limit the law with respect to im prisonment for Debt, whilst it will afford the neans of preventing debtors from leaving the

Colony claudestinely.

My attention has been seriously called to the present state of the law, respecting the sale of spirituous liquors, and to the necessity of rendering more efficient some of its provisions. In order to reduce in some degree the evils, which arise from the excessive use of this pernicious article, I shall propose to alter that part of the law, which permits a master to supply his free servants with spirituous liquors, in part payment of wages; and to check as far as possible the illicit dealing that now prevails, I shall pro pose to put the wholesale dealer under certain estrictons, in order that no person whatsoever in the Colony may be allowed to sell spitits without a licence. On this subject, I caused some time ago, circular letters to be written to the several benches of justices and Police Magis trates, in the Colony, which letters, together with the answers which have been received to them I shall speedily lay before you.

The "Act for restraining the occupation of Crown Lands," expiring on the 31st December next, it will be necessary to take into considera-tion, the expediency of renewing it. I am fully impressed with the importance in this partoral country, of giving every facility to the occupation, under proper restrictions, of the vacant lands of the Crown, and I shall readily give you my assent to any measure, which whilst it recognizes the rights of the Crown may permit to the honest settler, the occupation of these lands on easy terms, and at the same time, exclude as far as possible, men of decalety. as possible, men of dissolute character who nov only seek to become occupiers of them for dishonest practices.

OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL. important communications, which have been addressed to my Predecessor, and to myself, by Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies. It will be seen on a perusal of

these documents that this subject continues to occupy the attention of Her Majesty's Govern ment and that extensive measures bave been adopted, for introducing into this Colony, as large a supply as can be obtained of Mechanic and Agricultural labour. Fifteen large ships with Emigrants, selected by Government Agents, may be expected to reach the Colony in the course of the next twelve months, and this supply will be independent of the Emigrants who may be expected to be introduced by pri vate individuals under the system of Bounties. I am fully impressed with the vital importance of Immigration to this Colony, and ready to give to it every encouragement in my power. I will, moreover, freely lay before you all the in-formation of which I am in possession respecting

its progress. During the last Session of the Imperial Parliament, various Acts were passed for the improvement of the Criminal Law, which I think t will be desirable to adopt in this Country. A Bill therefore, to be presented to you for this

purpose.

There are several other measures of less gene ral importance which I shall, in the course of the Session, have occasion to bring before you "A Bill to regulate the admission of properly qualified persons to the practice of Medicine; one "to enable the principal Officers of Her Majesty's Ordnance to hold lands in the Colony; on "or the reduction of the fee on the registration of Vessels;" and several others, which it is unnecessary for me to mention.

I have directed the usual Accounts of Revenu and Expenditure for the last year to be laid be fore you, as well as Estimates for the ensuing The state of the Revenue continues, I am

happy to say most favourable.

I have observed with pleasure the progress which is making in the many public works com-menced under the Administration of my Prede essor. It is my intention, with your concur ence, to continue them with equal vigour With a view to obtain further means in the pre-sent searcity of labor for carrying on the public works, and to diminish the number of persons who are now unprofitably employed at the Penal Settlements, I propose to bring under your consideration the measure which was suspended during the last Session, "to enable the Governor to remit the punishment of a portion of the Convicts now serving under sentences of transportation to Norfolk Island and Moreton Bay," provided their conduct has been such, since their removal to those places, as to entitle them to a remission of punishment, and that they can with safety be returned to the Colony, on condition of working for a period in irons on the public works.

I cannot, gentlemen, conclude this Address without acknowledging to you, that in the matter of far higher importance than the mere increase of wealth—I mean the moral condition of the people-a residence of three months among you has caused me to form a far more favourable stimate of the Colony, than that which I entertained when I left England. Of your wide agricultural and pastoral districts I am not yet in a condition to offer any opinion; but in respect to Sydney aud its immediate vicinity, I feel happy to be able to avow that, I have found a fur greater degree of decorum and propriety of who seeing his danger, drew gently towards conduct to prevail than, from some accounts of him, and watching his opportunity closed with conduct to prevail than, from some accounts of

e numerous Churches, too, of all persuasions, which are already in progress, and in great part paid for by voluntary contributions, afford satisfactory proofs of a general desire to supply moral and religious instruction to the people from which we may draw a favourable augury for the future. But, Gentlemen, it must be conceded that much yet remains to be done, ere the evil impressions which have been raised respecting the operation of the convict system amongst us can be dissipated in quarters where it is most desirable that we should maintain a ood repute,—or ere the standard of morals can be so raised within the Colony itself as to afford a pledge for the security and happiness of its people.

ATTEMPT TO SHOOT .- Vesterday Mr. Heren es Watt, Tanner and Currier of Phillip-street brought before the police, a man named Henry Costello, who had threatened and attempted to shoot him under the following circumstances. Some time since Costello married a young girl under the idea that she had some property, but finding, such not to be the case, he parted with her on the very day they were married. Mr Watt having some knowledge of the girl, allowed her to come to his house for protection and obtained several situations for her, which she was obliged to leave on account of the out rageous conduct of Costello, who followed and abused her whenever he could find where she was residing. Last Friday-week when in a public house in Castlereagh-street, he stated to servant of Mr. Watt's, that he would shoot his master before a month, and on Thurs day it appears he attempted to put his threat into execution. During the afternoon of that day, he went up to Mr. Watt, who was standing at his door and demanded his wife; Mr. W. told him she was not there, and that he was at liberty to search; Costello then drew forth a pistol and presented it at the extremity of a curve formed by his arm, towards Mr. W. the Colony published in England, I had been led him, and after a severe struggle took the pistol from him and handed it over to Mr. Bell, Superintendent of the Emigrants; another pistol was also found in his pocket; the pistols were both loaded with ball, although one had but a small portion of powder the remainder having escaped during the scuffle. "Go and tell the Colonel," which he did immediately he had got his throat out of the vice like squeeze of Ogle. When the case came on to be heard, the Colonel benignantly, like his prototype Pickwick, forgave the allusion, and the constable not much caring about the squeez ing of his throat, they were discharged, after an admonition not again to resist constituted authorities.

The business on the free side of the Police Office, closed at 20 minutes past nine o'clock on Thursday morning, a circumstance unparralleled of late days.

Charles Beilby, tried the 14th ultimo, for defrauding his Creditors, before His Honor Mr. Justice Burton and a Military Jury, and who on that day was found guilty and remanded for setennce, was brought up yesterday and sen-tenced by His Honor to two years confinement in Sydney gaol.

By private Correspondence from Port Philip we learn, that the Gaol and Commissariat store at Melbourne, were totally consumed by fire The conflagration originated in a black native putting a firebrand into the thatch of the gaol the sparks from which, communicating with the stores ignited them, and burned the whole to the ground. Fortunately there were no pri soners for any heavy crime confined in the gaol at the time. The black who fired the building is in custody and has been committed for trial for the offence. There are also since the burning several other blacks been committed for trial for spearing sheep &c., and one for attempting to throw a spear at Captain Lonsdale, th lice Magistrate. All these prisoners are daily expected by the Sarah schooner.

The Revenue Cutter has brought up the wit nesses in the several Port Philip cases, and it is expected that they will come on for trial on Monday next. Amongst them is that of John Dignum, the companion of Commerford the murderer in many of his atrocities.

TO GEORGE CAVENAGH.

Your attempt to degrade me to your own level by scurrility is of no effect. I look upon you, as regards myself, as a cockchaffer in the hands of a schoolboy, impaled on a pin attached to a thread, and wheeled round for my own especial amusement. I am informed that my last, has had the effect which I contemplated at the time of my prescribing—writhings and biting of nails. I feel gratified that the skill, which I flattered myself I possessed, was on this occasion so satisfactorily applied, and when again needed is equally at your service. Take this by way of foretaste, if you understand the meaning of the word, which to me is very ques tionable—if not, apply to your pocket companion, "Walker." The respectability of the Com mercial, which you so much bewailed in your attempt to heap obloquy upon me, by publishing private and confidential correspondence, has re-bounded with tenfold violence upon your own head in the minds and opinions of all honorable men—stands thus: all respectable persone take in the Commercial Journal, and to its opinions pay no little attention, finding that we are neither to be frightened nor deterred from designating things by their proper names, nei-ther calling a breach of the Seventh Command-ment, Indiscretion, nor the Eighth, a Monomania, but just pronounce them in the way simple nature teaches us. On Tuesday night, a baker residing in Eliza beth street, named William Sullivan, went out leaving in his bakehouse a watch and two servants. Upon his return, he was informed that two women, named Jane Robertson and Mary Folkes, had been there, and upon their depar-ture the watch was missing. On Wednesday the woman Robertson went to the house of Bassett, the pawnbroker, in Phillip street, and of fered a watch for pledge; suspecting something wrong, he made an excuse that he wanted change, for the purpose of going out, when he procured a constable, but upon returning they found the woman had left the house; searching a small scrub in the rear of the house, the woman was discovered hid. Her companion in the rob bery, Folkes, was taken out of bed, in a house adjoining the bakery where the robbery had beer committed.

EXECUTION.—On Wednesday morning, the utmost penalty of the law was carried into effect upon the person of Commerford, who pleaded Guilty on Monday last to an information filed against him, for the wilful murder of constable Tompkins, at Deep Creek, near Port Phillip, on the 30th of December last, at which time he was in custody of Tompkins, another constable, and a sergeant of the 80th regiment having been sent from Sydney for the po of pointing out the remains of seven or eight murdered men, whom he had alleged, himself and a companion named Dignum, had murdered. The surviving constable had been dispatched to procure something they had left at their last encampment, and deceased was employed making a fire, the sergeant had incautiously placed his musket upon the ground while he went into the bush to procure some wood, when Commerford watching his opportunity seized upon the piece, Tompkins was a resolute and well conducted n an, and notwithstanding the threat of the murderer that he would shoot him, attempted to close, when the contents of the piece, a heavy charge of slugs, passed through his body. The sergeant hearing the report of it, came from the ush, when Commerford having possessed himself of the musket which had belonged to Compkins, presented it and threatened to shoot bim, the sergeant finding all resistance useless could not prevent Commerford taking the bush. He subsequently gave himself up to Mr. Ebden's overseer. Being a Catholic he was attended in his last moments by the Rev. Mr. M'Encroe. He made no public confession, and every prenaration having been made the drop fell and the oul of the murderer ascended to its maker. His body was buried within the precincts of the
