The whaling brigs Nereus and Mic-Mac have hauled alongside Messrs. Duke & Co.'s wharf to discharge their respective cargoes of oil into the Symmetry, laid on for London; they both will be refitted immediately after discharging for the whale fishery by Mr. John Jones, who has become the owner of both these vessels, having lately purchased the Nereus from Captain Duke The whaling speculation, we are happy to perceive, has prospered well with this gentleman.

A few years since he commenced the whaling trade with a small schooner, the Sydney Pucket, and now he is the owner of five fine vessels all in the trade, viz. the barques Caroline and Mag net, and brigs Mic-Mac, Genii and Nereus. So much for well conducted speculations.

The Van Diemen's Land packets William and Marian Watson are again loading for their usual destinations—the former for Launceston and the latter for Hobart Town.

The Magnet is daily expected up from New Zealand with a cargo of oil from the whaling stations on that coast. She will bring the first accounts of the success of the different gangs during the present whaling season. The whaling parties to the southward have been on the qui vive for some months past, all eager for the fray, having last season made a most excellent fall at the different whaling stations. At Van Diemen's Land they actually killed more fish than they had casks to stow away the oil after trying out the blubber; they were from that cause, on the advices from those places, all in high spirits, anticipating another rich harvest.

The Abercrombie has nearly completed the landing of her cargo; she will ballast immediately, and returning to the Isle of France for another cargo of sugar.

The American ship Tybee, Captain Millett, is taking in a cargo of Colonial produce for the American market. Captain M. intends to leave for the United States in the early part of the ensuing month, to return with a general cargo of American goods.

The Cape Packet whaler is getting a thorough repair from the hands of Mr. Bell, master ship wright: she will, when completed, be nearly equal to an A 1 vessel.

The passengers by the Amelia Thompson have been landed at Spring Cove Quarantine Station, and by the accounts received they are fast recovering their health.

By the last accounts from Lannceston we hear that the ship Honduras, which vessel got aground going down the river Tamar, bound to London, and sustained considerable damage, has been raised and undergone a thorough repair, and commenced taking in cargo for her old des-

Our law reading tells us, without the introduction of irrelevant matter, that the Jury in all cases take the law from the Judge and the facts from the witnesses; and that where any doubt arises-MARK !-- the prisoner is to receive the benefit of that doubt. Yet here we have the Foreman and another Juror inquisitorially putting questions to the prejudice of the accused, which had no more to do with what he was arraigned for, than if it occurred amongst the " Bedouins." Mr. Brenan swears that " Whitfield is as respectable a man as ever he knew in his walk of life." Mr. Ryan supports that testimony, and yet is a man's liberty to be trifled with, by putting questions, which in charity we believe not to be put prejudicially, and which might have ended God knows where but for

were irrelevant. Here was in this short sentence a lecture for a Jury—and a merited one-which we never before, nor we trust never will again hear from the lips of a Judge. We at one time trembled for Whitfield, being of opinion that prejudice had found its way into the Jury box; but we were relieved from any apprehension we labored under on that head, when the Chairman, in concluding his address, stated that they (the Jury) "had no case before them that could warrant a conviction."-It is instances of this description that induces, and properly too, the selection of Military Juries. In what we have said on the subject, we have not travelled out of the line of our duty. If individua's will sit on our Juries, they must always bear in mind, that they not only hold a responsible, but we may add a sucred character-and that in the dis charge of the duty they owe their country humanity must not be overlooked.

SUPREME COURT .- Nothing interesting has taken place in the Civil side during the past week which would warrant us in troubling our readers with a detailed account. Humanity of this description is worth all the coercion human ingenuity can invent.

We request Mr. Mitchell will have the goodness to appoint an intelligent constable for the purpose of making proclamations and swearing witnesses at Quarter Sessions. Now, when Inspector Ryan did this duty, it saved both Court and Jury many unhandsome observations.

THE THEATRE.

On Monday evening last, we went, "big with expectation," to witness the revival of the justly celebrated drama of The Jewess. The first act, we confess, went off with considerable eclatis the dresses, scenery, and tout ensemble were elegant and imposing for New South Wales; but the two succeeding acts fell far short of our auticipation, the acting of the principal characters being considerably inferior to that on its former representation. Mr. Lazar, as *Eleazar*, was hardly passable, compared with his former success in that character—he was perhaps too anxious about the success of the vertices of anxious about the success of the various arrangements of the evening to feel his character with enthusiasm. Mr. Spencer appeared even beneath himself, and far, very far below Munyard's personification of Leopold; imperfect in the dialogue, and unexpressive in the beautiful language of the author: his finest scenes lost the very shade of pathos and eloquence, and ren-dered his character, from first to last, to us a dull and monotonous disappointment. In Mrs. Taylor's Rachael we could discern but little improvement, with the exception of the last scene in the second act, when her appeal to Leopold's previous knowledge of her, was really beautiful. Perhaps the recollection of her former fame might have induced us to expect more from her talents; however, was converted. more from her talents; however, we cannot but acknowledge her to be the only individual in the company, whose conception of the character has been retained to advantage. Why, we would ask, was Mr. Collins allowed to resign De Brogni? he far excels Mr. Cameron; whose want of sympathy, stiffness of attitude, and incorrect reading, but ill accorded with the character he attempted to sustain. He would have looked the Emperor much better than Collins, and in that triffing above the sustain. Collins; and in that trifling character his im-perfections would have passed either unnoticed or forgiven. The Princess Eudocia was fairly sustained by Miss Winstanley. Mrs. Downes had perhaps more judgment and superior knowledge of stage tact than this young lady; but, as comparisons are said to be odious, we will accord that praise, which is justly due, and assert— that particularly in the later scenes, Miss W.'s Eudocia was a very creditable performance. Lee played in his usual animated style; and, though he has played Forrester better, it passed off with considerable admiration and applause. Mrs. Clarke's Abigail was middling; but we have heard her sing The Maid of Judah much better. The remaining characters were unworthy of notice. The combat was strained, unappreciated, and unnatural. The solo part of the chorus to the juicy wine, was ably executed by M1. Hollis. The very solemn chaunt in the last scene is illadapted to the pathetic nerves of Australasiatic play goers; and although the arrangements respecting the armed supernumeraries were, doubt-less, tedious and commendable, their irregular pacing and too frequent countermarches convey but a poor idea of the splendour and magnificence of ancient European grandeur .- Great praise is due to the spirited and liberal pro-prietor for his disregard of expence on the oc-casion; and, with the exception of the performers, we confess, that our high wrought expectations on the revival of The Jewess were

On arriving at the corner of George and King streets, the conduct of the sailor became outrageous; he struck the constable repeatedly, and endeavoured to throw him, calling him at the same time every opprobrious epithet that & Billingsgate vocabulary could dictate; and the worst part of the story remains to be told—that in this most unjustifiable aggression the thoughtless sailor was cheered on by those who ought to have known better. In England we know that such conduct would not be tolerated.

By the Customs' regulations it is necessary whenever a larger quantity than five gallons of spirits is removed from one part of the Colony to another, to take out a permit. This regula tion, however, appears to have fallen into entire disuse; for notwithstanding the great quantity of spirits that is daily removed from Sydney to of spirits that is daily removed from Sydney to the interior, it appears that during the year 1837 only one permit was taken out. Among the forms of receipt in the general abstract of the receipts of the Colony for the year 1837, we find "Permits to remove spirits, 6d." If the regulation has any object it would be well if it was carried into effect, and if it is of no use it may as well be expunged.—Herald.
