



Lord Bacon. IMMIGRATION.

IT appears by an abstract statement, published in a contemporary of last Wednesday, that the cost of Emigrants brought to this Colony is considerably less when introduced on the bounty system.

We consider the account quite satisfactory as proof that such is the fact. It behoves, therefore, our Government to look into it, and save the Colony from the extravagant expense it has so plainly been the instrument of putting it to.

It clearly shows that had the Emigrants per the five following ships, viz. the City of Edinburgh, the Andromache, the Alfred, the Union Castle, and the Duchess of Northumberland, forwarded to this Colony on the bounty principle, " been introduced by the Government at the same rate of cost as those who arrived in the Colony by the John Brrry, the total expense would have been £14,520;" whereas it appears, by the statement in question, that the total cost of the Emigrants by the abovenamed five ships, bringing six hundred and thirty souls to our shores, amounted to little more than onehalf, viz. £7,415.

The difference of the amount is certainly very great; and for the small, if any, differ ence in point of morality between the Emigrants selected by Mr. Marshall and those y the Government, we should without hesitation say, leave the future business of Immigration to Mr. Marshall, or let the Government adopt some more economical plan for the introduction of labour. This statement of one of our Merchants shows the bounty system to be the cheapest; and as we get no better supply in Government chartered vessels, touching that much required addition-morality, it must undoubtedy be the best.

We should be happy to learn the opinion of any gentleman more intimately acquainted than ourselves with this all-important subject, which, in order to keep it from dwindling into a mere job, should be constantly

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

TUESDAY, JULY 31.

The following account of the opinions of the Honorable Members in Council, relative to an alledged breach of privilege in the publication of certain correspondence in the Australian, between Richard Jones, Esq., M. C. and H. C. Wilson, Esq., First Police Magistrate, we copy for the perusal of our readers from the Sydney Monitor of Wednesday lust.—

Previous to the order of the day being called, Mr. Jones rose and said, that he had to complain of a breach of privilege by the publication of certain letters in the Australian newspaper. The allusion was to the debute on the country towns police bill, which in referring to the 15th clause, he was made to say as follows, "Mr. Jones observed that this clause was broken every hour in the day, in Sydney, even by the Chief Police Magistrate himself." Now on the very morning of the Publication, the letter referred to as No. 1 in it, was written by 9 o'clock in the morning, and sent to his office, where he received it at 10 o'clock. He had felt it unnecessary to account to Colonel Wilson, or to any one else for what dropt from him in the Council Cham ber, but he had answered that letter as far as he could, that no misunderstanding should exist upon the subject. He would read the whole correspondence as it appeared in that mornings

To the Editor of the Australian.

ber was prepared with any resolution on the Mr. Jones said he would not wish to move esolution—all he wished to guard against was mis-representations by the reporters, which led to these disagreeable communications.

The Governor said, that he thought the Council would agree with him that Mr. Jones had taken a very proper notice of the matter, and that Honourable Members were not to be called to account for the performance of the public du ties in council. However, as Mr. Jones did not wish to carry the matter any further, it would be as well to proceed with the business of the

day.

Mr. Jones said, that he complained of the insertion of his letter, as he had not given per mission for the publication of it, but had simply replied, (although he was not obliged to do so, to Colonel Wilson's letter, for that gentleman' satisfaction. Had he been aware that his letter would have been published, he would not have

answered. The Governor said, that there could be no doubt but that Mr. Jones' remarks were not intended to apply to Colonel Wilson disrespect fully, but simply to point out the inconvenience of the clause, which was so closely drawn, that even the Police Magistrate himself could not ometimes avoid a breach of it, not that he wil fully transgressed the law.

Mr. Berry said, he had no doubt but that was the meaning of Mr. Jones' remarks. He had often heard that the Chief Police Magistrate was a very daring man with horses (laughter) and he had frequently seen accounts in the newspapers of the narrow escapes he had had. indeed he had often thought it would be a good thing to make a motion in Council that he might be requested to take more care of himsel (much laughter).

The Attorney General said he was sure that

if Colonel Wilson had been in the gallery he would not have taken offence at what Mr. Jones said. NEW ZEALAND .- The Jess arrived at the Bay of Islands from Sydney, having been twenty six days on the passage; the Colonial whaler Vittoria was at the Bay on the 30th June, with 450 barrels of oil; the ship Seppings, bound from Hobart Town to London, had put into the Bay with loss of poop and other damages; H. M. S. Buffalo had also been compelled to put into the Bay twice through stress of weather on her voyage to England; the brig Martha, of Sydney, had been heard of going into Teuranga on the 3rd of June; the Genii was reported with 180 barrels; the London whaler Norwhal, Captain Brend, was at the Bay homeward-bound with 2,700 barrels of oil, making the eighth full ship by the same commander. The Bay of Islands had been surveyed by a French frigate, and the charts found to contain many errors; a French whaler had been ashore at Brompton Shoals, which led to the survey.—Herald.

We have been informed that the whole of the dwelling house, barns, stock yards, piggery, and every other conveniences, have been consumed by fire, belonging to Mr. Mann of the Hunter's River. His loss is calculated to be about £1500. A great quantity of maiz: was in the barn at the time of the fire, which was wholly consumed. It originated from the burning off some felled timber, the flames from which was carried by a high wind to the buildings, and before it could be extinguished, the above loss was the result.

On Wednesday he repeated his demand, accompanying it with threats of the most violent nature. Mr. Magner found it necessary on this constitute of and hide himself. cessary on this occasion to fly and hide himself. fully expecting that had Stokes succeeded in reaching him he should have received from his hands some grievous bodily harm. A warrant was taken out for Stokes' apprehension, and on Thursday last the Bench required him to find sureties for his good behaviour, himself to be bound in £10, and two sureties in £5 each.

BURGLARY .- On Wednesday night last, or early on Thursday morning, some of the lights fingered gentry of Sydney broke into the Edinburgh Castle public house, corner of Castlereagh and Bathurst-streets, and stole therefrom a silver watch and six sides of leather.

CAUTION TO FREE SERVANTS.—A free hired servant, named Michael Dunn, in the employ of Mr. Lee, merchant, was sentenced on Thursday, to three weeks' hard labour in Carters' Barfor neglect of duty, and using abusive language to his master when in a drunken state, on Wednesday last, at a time when he should have een better employed.

THE "ALLIGATORS,"-On Wednesday night last, several of the Alligator seamen were scud-ding about our metropolis without rudder or compass, and consequently run themselves aground. Two were put into a dry cell to removal at the Liverpool Bench.
