MILITARY ESCORT.-His Excellency the Governor is pleased to direct the publication of the following General Order, dated 22nd September, 1832, No. 222, pointing out the duty of Military Escorts when required to aid the civil

By His Excellency's Command E. DEAS THOMSON.

(COPT.)—GENERAL OZDER, No. 222, SYDNEY, 22ND SEPTEMBER, 1832.—The following instructions are to be strictly attended to by officers and non-commissioned officers commanding detachments of infantry at out station

sist in the execution of a warrant, the party is to be immediately granted by the officers or non-commissioned officers in command, provide that a Justice, or the chief or principal con of the district proceeds with the party If the Justice or officer shall afterwards leave the party with which he set out, the party is to return immediately to quarters.

Parties for the escort of prisoners are to be

furnished when applied for by a Justice of the Peace personally, or in writing, provided that the escort be accompanied by a constable hold-ing the magistrate's warrant and having charge of the prisoners. The scort being furnished to protect the constable in the execution of the warrant, and to prevent rescue or escape, the non-commissioned officers commanding the es-cort will carefully attend to the constable's directions for such purposes. The distance to which escorts are to proceed will be regulated as fur as practicable by the situation of the military post, gaol, or lock up house, in the direction of their route. Escorts on leaving the detachmen will always be furnished with a written paper of route, showing the distance they are to proceed, with the places they are to hait at, and the

number of days for which they are rationed.

A return is to be forwarded to the Brigad Office on the last day of every month, showing the number and strength of escorts furnished during that month. In the event of any duty being required beyond what the strength of the detachment can with propriety perform, as in mediate report is to be made of the circum-stance to the Major of the Brigade at Sydney. When escorts arrive at one military post from another, the officer or non commission at the former will furnish a like escort to pro eeed with the prisoners, if required by the con stable holding the warrant so to do.

Officers and non-commissioned officers in

ommand at the out stations will turn out the detachments in support of the civil power for the suppression of riot, or the preservation of the peace, whenever required by the Sheriff of the Colony or by any Justice of the Peace.

The Mounted Police, at outstations where infantry are quartered, are subject to the orders of the officer in command, in all matters of mili tary duties, and interior economy in bar racks and stables, but they will receive thei orders from the Justices of the Peace of the dis trict in which they may be stationed. The foregoing instructions for escorts do not there fore relate to the Mounted Police, who will re eive their orders through their own officers .-By Command, &c.

INFORMERS .- Our readers are perhaps un aware that these gentry are on the alert, par-ticularly on Sandays. While these worthies are prowling about to watch the due observance of the Sabbath by her Majesty's liege publicans and shopkeepers, they are regardless of their own breaches of the Sabbath, and go about attending to their business. We are informed that a ticket of leave holder is linked in with the rest of these gentry. Being upon this matter we beg to correct our contemporary the Monitor as to the manner of Informations being laid. In England, and we should apprehend all other places under her Majesty's do minions, all Informations for pecuniary penal-tics under penal statutes must be reduced to writing. It must set forth the christian and surname, trade and residence of the Informer, and that in so clear a manner, that the least deviation will render the information liable to be dismissed. The day of the offence is next stated; the place, the statute under which the offence is complained of, and the amount of the penalty incurred by the party is next minutely set forth. Upon this information being filed with the Magistrates, (not on oath) a sum-mons, completely the echo of the information is issued, a day given for the hearing, and here the duty of the informer ends, except as to his appearing as counsel for himself, by pro-ducing a witness to prove the allegations set forth in the information. The Informer him self is never allowed as a witness, nor can be be examined, as he is the interested party seek ing the penalty or some part of it. And if it should appear that the witness is to be a participator in the penalty in the smallest degree; the would also be disqualified from becoming a witness in support of the information. Such s the practice, and if any deviation takes place, it is clearly unlawful.

A KIND MASTER.-On Monday last a man named John Rumsey appeared by warrant to answer a charge of neglect of work, preferred by his master Mr. Girard. The man said he had no intention to break the agreement, and was ill at the time when his master stated he had neg lected his duty. Mr. G. said he was not ill bu drunk, but he would not press for punishmen provided the man would return to his work The prisoner consented, and the Bench allowed him to go at large by paying expenses. UNLICENSED CARTER .- On Tuesday week last,

It having come to the knowledge of Mr. Francis that a portion of the cedar had been purloined by the carter, he had him apprehended on Saturday last. On the hearing of the case on Monday the prisoner was remanded, to give time for Mi Francis to measure the cedar in order to see if that carted by Windsor and the planks taken of the cart tallied with the amount of feet entered in Mr. Girard's book.
