As the Public or Queen's Wharf is at present so confined, every improvement of this nature to the private properties is a public benefit.

The good folks at Newcastle seem to be before. hand with us here in the Regatta line. A match for a silver cup, valued at £30, is notified to come off on the 29th instant-£1 entrance for each boat. Five of the Newcastle slashers have been entered to contend for the prize, and which is open to all Ports. If the weather was a little finer, a boat or two from Sydney might perhaps run down to that Port, to have a trial with them, but at present the wind is too boisterous

The ships Bengal Merchant and Elizabeth are expected to sail during the day for Java.

The schooner Minerva sails for the Bay of Islands, New Zealand, in the early part of next week. The brig Martha goes to New Zealand immediately to bring up another cargo of oil, procured by the whaling parties on that coast.

We understand application has been made to the Government by the owners of the little schooner Sarah for the Revenue cutter Prince George to be despatched along the coast to the southward, as it is feared that the light seen by the Kate, on her way up to Sydney from Port Phillip, was a signal from some ship-master's vessel wanting assistance; and as the Sarah had not reached Port Phillip up to the date of the sailing of the Henry Freeling, fears are entertained for her safety. She had several passentained for her safety. She had several passengers on board. The Government will not, we opine, lose a moment in affording the assistance

The Bengal Merchant has dropped down below Pinchgut ready for sea; but, like all vessels that have visited this Port lately, is detained for want of hands-her original crew having, in consequence of the better rate of wages, de-serted. Thus this vessel is lying at a very heavy expense to her owners almost useless, or at least unprofitable.

The weather to the southwafd of Twofold Bay is described by the vessers coming from that route as unusually severe and boisterous, whilst till within the last few days the weather here has been more like summer—a gale of wind having scarcely been experienced off this port on the coast all the winter.

The Kinnear went out on Monday with a slashing south-west wind, which took her off the land in a very few hours. Captain Mallard, her worthy Commander, expects to be out here again from London in about nine months.

The brig William, belonging to the firm of Simmons & Co. proceeds to sea this week for Timor, whither she goes to purchase a cargo of sandal wood and other articles the produce of that country. The Isabella (late Government schooner) is also bending her sails for the same route. Mr. T. Watson, late of the William, commands her; he expects to be taken up by Captain Bremer, of the Alligator, as a provision tender for the settlement at Port Essington. As it is only a few days sail from that Port to Ti mor, where buffalos and pigs may be purchased in any quantities. The schooner is well adapted for that service, having a 'tween decks just suit able for taking cattle.

The rival packets, Abercrombie and Marian Watson are using all possible despatch in loading for the Derwent: the former is taking in teas from the Lady Hayes at Messrs. Lamb & Co.'s wharf, and the latter is loading at the Queen's wharf; they will most probably sail in the course of to-morrow. The William (Thom) sails for Launceston about Saturday.

The tars on board Her Majesty's ships of war Alligator, Britomart and Beagle, are all on the tip top of expectation to know who and how many of them will be permitted to visit the Theatre to-morrow evening-Sir Gordon Bromer having with the other Officers consented to patronize the benefit of Mrs. Taylor. No doubt a crowded house will be the result of Captain Bremer's patronage. \

THE FEMALE FACTORY.

Of all the appointments made by the Home Government to fill offices in this Colony, that of Mrs. Leach to the Female Factory at Parramatta, is one of the most absurd, and shows, more particularly in this proceeding, the glaring want of discrimination on the part of the Secretary for the Colonies, Lord Glenelg, touching our interests and welfare.

A female in England receiving such an appointment, knows as little of the nature of the office for which she is destined, as the prisoner who embarks for these Colonies, knows the nature of the employment to which he may be called on his arrival. Therefore, there is as much culpability attached to the receiver, labouring under such ignorance, as in the giver, who would show his wisdom as a legislator, to more advantage, by leaving this, and in fact all minor appointments under our Colonial Government to its own unbiassed selection and judgment. We have plenty among us far better adapted to fill the situation of Matron (if a woman it the self-satisfied Secretary for the Colonies; but, although we have plenty of women fit for the situation, as far as it is possible for them to be, yet we are decidedly of opinion that a woman is not sufficiently powerful in determination, to rule a multitude of the worst of the human race-for who will not acknowledge that a vitiated woman is worse person to rule this garrison of furies, and by the re-instalment of the late Superintendent, Mr. Bell, Sir George Gipps has again shewn lady has sprained her delicate ancle, and many his willingness to approve of the doings of a beautiful charger disabled, is now a road of

being of this Colony will not be so much retarded shortly, as it has been of late, as our principal guardian, in the Mother Country is spoken of as about to proceed to India to take the reins of Government in that portion of Her Majesty's dominions. There is no doubt but the cunning Lord has arranged matters with the Home Government, so that the nomination of his subordinates shall rest entirely with his will, and if so, the consequences will be, a clean turn out of most of those at present holding office. But, to our

subject—the Female Factory. Mr. Bell, who previous to Mrs. Leach's arrival filled the office of Governor to this Institution, had become so well known to those darlings who paid him a visit about every month, that they began to grow disgusted with him for his want of feeling towards the soft sex, and some few had determined, in consequence, to turn their backs upon him for ever. But no sooner than the report had got about of a Matron, (a new and inexperienced female from England,) having again taken charge of this delectable mansion for the depraved and vicious of England's belles, than the list at the Police Office daily increased, and, as a matter of course, masters and mistresses were put to much inconvenience, which had in a great measure abated up to the time of the removal of Mr. Bell.

We trust that Mr. Bell. after he resumes is duties in this arduous situation, will soon be able, particularly as the cells are nearly completed, to bring matters as regards these notorious characters to a proper and tolerable tone, causing thereby a great saving to the public purse.

It is acknowledged by the world at large that "variety is charming;" and this the female portion of our prison population know full well. No sooner are they versed in the duties of a situation, than they become tired and want a change, which they know is easy to be procured through the Factory, and to get there they are insolent and refractory.

It has been found by an abundance of experience that the punishments at the Female Factory is inadequate to compel its inmates to mend their manners, and therefore it cannot be considered a punishment at all. The celts, ah! the sound of that word will act as a talisman to humble the obdurate, and silence the boisterous profaner. The pleasure derived by those who have suffered incarceration in the few cells that have for some time past been ready for use, has spread abroad, and already does its relation influence the conduct of the insolent and drunken visitors to this " country seat."

His Excellency has acted wisely in caus ing the erection of these cells; but he should not stop here, as many of the prisoners confined within the Factory walls are well able to turn a tread-mill. Perhaps some would ask, how can women be compelled to labour in this way, if they choose to be obstinate? We then should reply, if their obstinacy is of such a nature that persuasion will have no avail, then let them be forced into the cells, and made to remain there exactly double the time they had been doomed to work on the mill. But this particular should be observed, that if they work well, let them be accordingly fed: if otherwise, the coarsest and scantiest diet should be substituted.

The complainant stated, that defendant entered her domicile, and after wounding her tender feelings, scull dragged he into the yard, and battered her poor dear face most "harmoniously." "Your worships," continued the complainant, "I'm a quiet, sober, unoffensive, good, kind, and obedient wife; I never says nothing to nobody, no, not I; I've lived a million of years in this Colony, and bears the best of characters, and all my neigh-bours respect me, your worship; I'm a quiet unoffensive woman, I am. I washes for a lady. "I was all about mangling, which Duffy knows." Defendant, a self-confident little jewess stated, she did not ill-treat the quiet little woman as laid down by the complainant. were then brought forward to substantiate the evidence of the assaulted one, who fully bore her out in her statement. ### Supreme Court .-- Criminal Side,

### (The Chief Justice on the Bench.)

SATURDAY. Aug. 18 .- On the adjourned Court being opened, Francis Moore, Esq., formerly of Christ Church College, Oxford, M.A., and Bar-rister at Law, applied to be enrolled among the Barristers of our Supreme Court.—Granted.

The Attorney General then prayed the judgment of the Court upon the prisoners that were remanded during the present Session.

Patrick Creenan, convicted of a highway robery, was then brought up for sentence; and after a few preliminary observations from His Honor, the prisoner was ordered to be trans-ported to Norfolk Island for life. Death

#### Thaddeus Meehan, convicted of burglary-Death Recorded.

John Jones, convicted of manslaughter-Life to Norfolk Island. The prisoner was indicted for murder; and the Judge said, that from the evidence, the jury would have been warranted in finding him guilty thereof, but they had taken a merciful view of the case, and therefore his life

John Oddy, convicted of arson-Transported for life to Norfolk.

James O'Brien Croker, who pleaded guilty to a charge of fraud, in having certified to the fact that £5 was due to an individual for the apprehension of a runaway convict, and which amount he appropriated to his own use. Sentenced to two years' imprisonment in Her Majesty's Gaol, at Newcastle, which afterwards was changed to Sydney at his particular request.

John Dignum, the companion of Commerford, who was convicted of a highway robbery—To be transported to Norfolk Island and worked in irons for life, with a recommendation that he never more be allowed to return to this Colony. James Conner, the prosecutor in the case of Christopher Murphy, for stealing in the dwelling house of Walter Buckingham, of Sydney, n the 19th of March last, was allowed to go at large on bail, on the motion of Mr. Moore.

As the witnesses in the case of one James Keeffe, a soldier, and one Shepherd, were not in attendance, their trials were postponed.

The following were discharged by proclama-tion: - William and Ann Wilson, Ann Williams, James Ogden, William Clarke, Nicholas Connor, Charles Goodwin, James Kelly, William Ross-thorne, Thomas Mullens, and the following four aboriginees-Pretty boy, Brambly, Captain, and Jackey. These latter were discharged in c nsequence of the Attorney-General not being able to procure an interpreter.

With the exception of two or three cases, which the Attorney General observed would have been dealt with at the last Quarter Sessions, but for the absence of witnesses, the Assize Calendar was clear; and those, with the exception of two prisoners, were admitted to bail. These two, His Honor stated, he should sit to try on the following Tuesday, as it appeared the witnesses had arrived from Port Phillip.

Tuesday, August 21 .- His Honor the Chief Justice took his seat on the Bench according to adjournment, when William Davis and John O'Neil were arraigned, and chose Military Ju-ries. The men were indicted for receiving stolen property at Port Phillip. The Court adjourned sine die, as it was impossible to say when a Military Jury could be procured; but in all probability they would be tried this day (Wed-

# Parramatta Quarter Sessions.

MONDAY, AUGUST 13.

Before the Chairman, and Messrs, M'Kenzie, Lawson, Forster, and P. L. Campbell, Esqs., and a Civil Jury.—

John Spencer, per Hive, life, assigned to Mr. Smith, senr. of Baulkham Hills, was charged with having on the 27th of June last, entered his master's room, wrenched his writing desk from the stand to which it was fixed, and earrying it off with upwards of £80, besides other valuable property contained in it and planting it in the bush; after which he returned to his service but absconded on the following day. A party of the Parramatta Police went in search of the box. The prisoner hearing this sent word to his master that if he would forgive him, he would return the box unopened. His master took the constables with him, and the prisoner directed the party to where the desk was planted.

It was found unopened. In defence the prisoner denied having taken the box, and stated that he lighted on it by chance planted in the bush. The Jury found him guilty of robbing his master, and he was ordered to be worked for

three years in an ironed-gang.
Samuel Bouncer, per Lady Nugent, for life, was charged with having in April last, robbed Michael Maloney, a ticket-of-leave holder, in the district of Liverpool, under the following circumstances. Maloney had been hired with a person named Dungarnie, and as their master was about going to the interior, he gave the prosecutor an order for £2 5s. to keep him in money until his return. On receiving this order the prosecutor went into his hut, and in the presence of the prisoner, he deposited the same in his prayer book; on the following morning he discovered that it had been taken away. It was subsequently proved that the prisoner wrote the prosecutor's name on the back of the same order came into Parramatta and there got it cashed by a Mrs. Barclay, on the recommendation of a clerk in the employ of Messrs. Tingcombe and Watkins who proved Mr. Dungarnie's signature to be correct. Guilty.-To be worked in irons for three years.

Patrick Rogers, (free), was convicted of stealing a silk handkerchief, the property of Mr. Betts, but having received a tolerable good character from the prosecuter, the Chainian gave him the benefit of it, and sentenced him to only six months in the House of Correction. Margaret Marne, (free by servitude,) was charged with having robbed her fellow servant, named James Davis, of five shillings and some coppers, at the house of Mr. Broadbent, a licensed publican. It appeared that the prose-cutor was on the day of the robbery, paid his wages in the presence of the prisoner, by his master, Mr. Broadbent, whose cook he made been for some time. On the day in question prosecutor went into the kitchen and treated prisoner to half a pint of rum, and on becoming intoxicated he fell asleep, during which time, the prisoner availed herself of the opportunity and committed the robbery above stated. She was found guilty and sentenced to twelve months confinement in the third class of the

Factory.
Ann Shannon, (free), was found guilty of endeavouring to escape from Parramatta gaol, and sentenced to six months imprisonment.
