The John Bull.-The following is an extract of a letter from a gentleman who left this Colony for the United States last year, it is dated in February last, - 1 have heard some particulars of the long lost John Bull, whaler, of Sydney. She was wrecked (I believe) on one of the Caroline Islands; the only survivor, a man named O'Connell, was in Boston when I was there, and published a short narrative of his adventures on the Island. He was rescued from the natives by an American whaler, after a resi dence there of nearly nine years. He (O'Con-nell) gives a very unfavourable account of poor Barkus, the master of the John Ball, who, was unfortunately drowned. The Pamphlet is entitled "OConnell's adventures in the Pacific,' printed at Boston, 1837. I read the work, and considered it bore the aspect of truth."-Herald.

The schooner Henry Freeling got on the point off the Battery, coming into the Cove on Thursday, and remained till the next tide. She is loading for Port Phillip.

The whaling barque Lady Blackwood, belong. ing to this Port, has put into Port Stephens to refresh. As the first Session under the adminis ration of SIR GEORGE GIPFS, is drawing to a close, several questions naturally suggest themselves, as to what has been done, and how much for the benefit of the people and the welfare of the Colony.

There is no doubt but His Excellency and his honorable Council, have had quite enough to do during the Stime have proposed, amend and many a useful bill into law; amusing the public with their oratory and lengthy debates, which might have been much shorter, for

the great good they have done the Colony. Allowing SIR GEORGE GIPPS every credit for doing his best for the welfare of the people, we cannot but say that comparatively little has been done for the benefit of the Colony, during the present Session. That much has been done, to bring it into a state of bankruptcy, no one can deny. Look at the Estimates for 1839, for instance; see there the intended lavish expenditure of the public money, and say would an independent Governor suffer us to be so heavily and so unjustly burdened. No, no. We see, as it were, the grasping hand of the father of placemen, compelling him to act in this oppressive manner towards our youthful country.

The manner in which some of the new and amended acts, will operate upon the Colony, remains to be seen. With regard to the Estimates, which include the allowances and pensions, it is not very difficult, already, to surmise the good effect they will have upon the public treasury. Such a shameful waste of public money, we think, it may safely be asserted, was never before voted in this Colony in any previous Session; and we have our doubts if any other British Colony would rest so contented under such gross impositions.

Pensions we abominate in all cases; but when the Government Officers, appointed by the Home Government to act in a prison Colony, choose to retire, we cannot see the justice in being ordered by the meddling Secretary for the Colonies, to pay them from our purse a wholesale bonus, or a yearly pension. The system is decidedly bad; and and if such proceedings are to be continued in this Colony, we shall rapidly retrogade, and 'our late flourishing prospects vanish as smoke. The whole Colony should set their faces against such impositions, as a downright robbery. It is not in the nature of men to sit down quietly under such circumstances, and we doubt not but His Excellency will see the necessity, before next Session, of retrenchment and reform in the Colonial Expenditure.

His Excellency Sir George Gipps attended at the Dock-yard on the landing of the female prisoners from the ship John Rennick on Wednesday morning last. Before any of them were sent to their services, His Excellency addressed them in a very impressive manner for a considerable time, pointing out to them the advantage they would derive from good conduct, and assuring them of such indulgences as they may deserve; but should they by a vicious course commit themselves, he assured them that he was placing the female Factory under such restrictions, that by solitary confinement and other punishments they would find it anything but what they might be led to suppose. The Surgeon Superintendent bore testimony to their general good conduct, but there were several exceptions, these he individually addressed, and to one female in particular, named Hatwell, he in calling her out from amongst the rest, informed her that it had been represented to him that although she was a very young woman, had received a superior education and was respectably connected, still she was the worst conducted woman in the ship, and that it had been stated, she was out in this Colony before and committed her present crime merely to get here again, he therefore felt it his duty to in form her that he considered her a very unfit person to be placed in any family, and he should send her to the Factory for three years, and to be spent in solitary confinement where human voice would seldom reach her. She seemed much affected with her sentence, and assured His Excellency, that she had never been to this Colony, but had been at South Australia, where she only remained ten weeks and returned to England. His Excellency hen told her that her future destiny depended entirely upon her own conduct. A Committee of ladies was also in attendance to perform the praiseworthy duty of distributing religious books amongst them. The Lord Bishop of Australia gave them a suitable address. OTABLITE .- Atrocious Attempt at Murder .-

Three weeks previous to the Rob Roy leaving this place, the house of the American Consul (Mr. Mollineaux,) was broken into, and the inemates most dreadfully wounded. The circumstances are as follow. A Spaniard (who has since been apprehended,) states, that about 8 o'clock on Saturday night, 30th June, he was in company with one Joseph Gill, an English carpenter, and agreed to go with him to rob that gen leman's house. They arrived at Mr. Mollineaux's between 2 and 3 on Sunday morning, whenthe carpenter cut away three of the blinds of the windows, and went into the parlour, where he found some gin, a bottle of which he handed to the Spaniard, at the same time saying, "now is the time to come in, for they are all asleep." Immediately after wards they heard a noise, and on looking round they saw Mr. M. opening the parlour door, and the earpenter knocked him down and stabbed him in several places. Mrs. M. hearing the dis turbance screamed for assistance; upon which they both proceeded to the bed room, where she was, and severely wounded her, by laying her head open with an axe, and stabbing her in se veral places. Mrs. M. received seven wounds, and her life was despaired of; but Mr. M. was enabled to go about on crutches when the Rob Roy sailed, although he had received thirteen severe wounds, and the sinews of his legs were cent completely through. On the following pages. severe wounds, and the snews of his legs were cut completely through. On the following morning at day-light, the Spaniard was observed by the natives busily employed in the water near his residence, to which place they repaired, and found his clothes (which were covered with blood), tied up and sunk with a stone; he was investigated a symptotical to the same with a stone; he was immediately apprehended, when he confessed the crime—at the same time implicating the carpenter as an accessary. It also appeared in evi-dence that the carpenter had been working for Mr. Mollineaux, and on the previous night asked him for some money, when Mr. M. replied "] have no change." The carpenter was then heard to say, that "Mr. M. should not live long if he kept him without his money." The Spaniard it appears borrowed a knife (which was afterwards found in the bed-room of Mr. M,) from his landlord, with which he stabbed Mr. and Mrs. M. his shoes were also found near to the parloun window, under the varandah. There was a large cut in the bedpost, which appeared to have been done with an axe, at the time of making a blow at Mrs. M. They are both in double irons, and are to be sent to Sydney for trial as soon as a man of war arrives at that port .- Gazette.

Cheese from Potatoes .- Cheese, it is said, of extremely fine quality, is made from potatoes, in Thuringia and part of Saxony, in the following manner:—After having collected a quantity of potatoes of good quality, giving the preference to the white kind, they are boiled in a caldron, and after becoming cool, they are peeled and reduced to a pulp either by means of a grater or mortar. To five pounds of this pulp, which ought to be as equal as possible, is added a pound of sour milk, and the necessary quantity of salt. The whole is kneaded together, and the mixture covered up and allowed to lie three or four days, according to the season. At the end of this time it is kneaded anew, and the cheeses are placed in little baskets, when the superfluous moisture is allowed to escape. They are then allowed to dry in the shade, and placed in layers in large pots or vessels, where they must remain for 15 days. The older these cheeses are the more their quality improves. Three kinds of them are made. The first, which is the most common, is made according to the proportions above indicated; the second with four parts of potatoes, and two-thirds of curdled milk; the third, with two parts of potatoes, and four parts of cow or ewe milk. These cheeses have this advantage over every other kind, that they do not engender worms, and keep fresh for a great number of years, provided they are placed in a dry situation, and in well-closed vessels.—From a late London Paper,
