" Knowledge is power."

SINGULAR whisperings, with regard to the discipline exercised over the females per John Remwick, Captain Byron, have gone abroad, which, if true, do not reflect much credit on the characters of those concerned. It is to be hoped that the facts of the case will be ascertained, and a strict inn take place. One female, the vestia on the feminine side of the transaction, has been forwarded to the Parramatta Factory, with, we understand, a heavy addition to her original sentence. She is stated to be the daughter of wealthy Jewish parents in London, but has come out under the pretended name of Hartwell. Her beauty is said not to be first rate, but quite attractive enough to create a feeling of sympathy and jeulousy, on the part of those on board, who considered their evil doings on the briney waters, would never be brought to an account on their arrival in this Colony.

#### Court of Requests.

In considering this very important mat ter, we wish it to be distinctly understood that any observations which we may have occasion to offer are not intended to apply per-sonally to any officer attached to this Establishment, we shall as become us as public Jour-nalists, and guardians of the general interests of the public, lay before our readers a system which change of times and circumstances render it necessary loudly to call for a radical change, or at least considerable amendment in the working of this important branch of judicature.

In the first place we shall endeavour to shew the practice, system, and expences of the Courts of Requests in England. Secondly, the like as followed in this Colony, and then by comparing the one with the other leave the public to judge between the two, and respectfully calling on the Legislature for their interference to remedy, and re-model the law in that respect.

To commence, we shall first take into consideration the Courts of Requests for the City of London, and we have no hesitation in stating that a Court established for such a city must have been founded upon the judgment of men of unquestionable wisdom and talent, and it the law framed to answer the ends and purpose of that great metropolis, has been found suffi-cient, as it has for the last half century, we see no reason why similar measures might not be adopted in this comparatively small but rising

In the City of London then, where money is undoubtedly more plentiful than in New South Wales, we find that a Court of Requests is supported there at more than three-tourths less expence than the Courts of Requests in this Colony. The only officers of such Court being a chief clerk, two assistants with two bailiffs and their assistants. The Commissioners being chosen monthly from their fellow citizens in like man ner as jurors. The Court sits twice a week, and issues one hundred summonses for each Court-day. The charges being one shilling for sum monses on debts under £2; and 2s for those where the amount exceeds that sum. If the defendant should not attend the first summons, the plaintiff takes out an attachment, or in words a kind of second summons, which must be served personally on the defendant, and thereby preclude the possibility of any excuse being offered, that he had not been duly summoned. If the defendant should not appear upon the attachment, the Commissioners then occed to hear the case exparte, and then the matter is fully investigated. The plaintiff being obliged to produce satisfactory proof of the debt in order to obtain his judgment, not in such manner as in our Courts of Requests, where some paltry, miserable pander of a collector comes and swears that he had applied for such and such a debt, and the party had promised payment, a system so abominable, that we wonder some measures have not been taken for the expulsion of these shirtless vagabonds from the Court. We never see them in the Supreme Court. The Judges would never tolerate such

The bailiffs of the Court of Requests in London are a set of men widely different from those of our Colonial Courts of Requests. The former being men of substance, and bound in sufficient sureties for the indemnity of the public against any illegal or oppressive acts; and so fully does such system answer, that we never heard of any action having been brought against any of them for misconduct or oppression. Whilst the bailiffs of the Courts in this Colony are a set of paupers or prisoners of the Crown, from whom no re dress for wrongs could be obtained in matters which often savour of oppression, extortion, and illegality. The poverty of the one, and the law precluding the other from being sued, whilst laouring under sentence, leaves the public without the means of such redress, and therefore open to every act of violation which they may choose or

practice. In proceeding we will take the next largest town in the British metropolis—namely, the Borough of Southwark; the Court of Requests there being governed by two Chief Clerks, as-sisted by a number of inhabitants chosen monthly as Commissioners, in like manner as those in London. Three being a sufficient num-ber to adjudicate on debts under 40s. and five for debts over that sum. So in like manner the Court of Requests for the City of Westminster. That for the Tower Hamlets, and another for the whole County of Middlesex, are conducted by Chief Clerks and Commissioners, chosen in like manner as in the City of I ondon. All these Courts are conducted by Chief Clerks, who are admitted Attorneys, sitting with the Commissioners to instruct them as to any legal questions which might arise before them. In the Middle-sex Court, however, the Chief Clerk is as sisted by a Barrister at Law, whose salary amounts to £200 a year or thereabouts.

Having thus stated the practice, we now prong a judgment in these cheap Courts, and then by comparison we shall find a vast difference between those costs and the Charges of the Sydney Court.

subjected to those of rule, order, or attachment where they appear to the first summons, by which more than one third will be taken off.

In the Southwark Court the plaintiffs are ob liged to deposit the sum of 10s. at the time wher they take out summonses, which the Commis-sioner may award to the defendant for his loss of time, in case the plaintiff's claim should prove frivolous or vexatious.

So far we have shewn the costs of the London Courts of Requests. What they amount to in this colony our readers but too well know. We have calculated that the Court of Requests for New South Wales exacts from the pockets of her distressed population, a sum of money amounting to nearly £300 per month. We, often see six hundred cases, and seldom less than four hundred set down for hearing in three days, and although we are ready to bear testi mony to the upwright intentions of the Com missioner, we cannot admit that the number of causes will allow of sufficient time necessarily equired in many intricate and contested cases

It has frequently come under our observation that dozens of summonses have been sworn to as having been served on defendants, when such has actually not been the case. In other cases we have found that drunken fellows employed in the service of process, have neglected to mon defendants to the great damage of plain tiffs, and to cover their acts of negligence and inattention, have returned that defendants were not to be found, when they might have been seen at any hour. And it cannot be denied that almost every Court produces instances where summonses have never reached the hands of de fendants through the careless and slovenly man

ner of serving the process of he Court
We are most anxious and willing to aware Mr. Commissioner Therry, our entire confidence and praise for his honest, impartial, and just administration of his duties as Judge of the Courts of Requests as far as his judgment and abilities permit him. But we do suggest, that the time has now arrived when the Courts of Requests should pass into other hands, and for the reasons which we will hereafter state.

In the first place then, we find ourselves heavily taxed with expenses as will appear very manifest upon reference to the Estimates for the ensuing year, and therefore, the first and strong. est reason for the abolition of the office of Com missioner of the Courts of Requests is retrench ment of the vast expence occasioned by such an

In the next place we have now amongst u men of consequence, respectability and talent as amply qualified to sit as Commissioners of our Courts of Requests as in the mother coun try, and surely no gentleman, merchant or shop-keeper, can think it too much trouble in serving his country by sitting as a Commissioner for eight days, or twice a week during the month which may come to his rotation about once in three years. 'These important duties may there fore be well performed by our fellow Townsmen at a vast saving of public money. The costs of the Court might be reduced above one half, and the public obtain law from week to week at a cheap rate, and by such means recover small debts which otherwise would be lost to them, by parties quitting the capital or leaving the Colony altogether during the intervals of monthly Courts. These matters are of the utmost importance to suitors, and we beg to call the at ention of the Government to them.

Having shewn two strong reasons why the Courts of Requests could dispense with its p.esent extensive establishment, we shall endeavour to point out, that by choosing Commissioners from the general body of the inhabitants, we shall have the assistance of men in business. tradesmen, or mechanics, better qualified for adjudication of matters in dispute ties, than gentlemen bred to the law, who have no idea of carpenters' or bricklayers' work. 1 very frequently occurs that disputes arise as to the value of goods, or work done, which are referred by the Commissioner to tradesmen or mechanics, at considerable delay and expense to suitors: whilst such matters coming before Com. missioners acquainted with trade, tradesmen themselves, will be most likely to be decided at once, and much more honestly, than y one or two referees, who are generally friends of one party or the other, or by some umpire fixed upon by them. We therefore do persist, that none but tradesmen can properly decide matters of this kind between party and party; and that at a saving of much money to the Co

In concluding these remarks we repeat that we do consider that the worthy Commissioner of the Court has been always actuated by an honest and conscientious zealof doing Justice to all parties. But that some alteration in the courts is now necessary, and for the causes alone attempted to be shewn, no person can reasonably for one moment doubt—particularly as to the expulsion of these run about pettilogging law agents, whose interference is only calculated to do harm instead of good; let every one, plaintiff as well as defendant, come before the Court in propria persona, or if he choses to send an agent, let such agent be authorised by writing, and sworn, that he has been duly authorised to appear; but not to permit him to prove a debt, from a few words warily drawn by him from the mouth of an ignorant or unguarded person, by surprise, for the purpose of qualifying such agent to swear to the admission of a debt, or in fact, to any thing else, to fill up a vacant chasm, for we do not hesitate to affirm, that one half which these fellows swear, for their half crown fees, emanates from falsehood and perjury.

LICENSED PUBLICAN'S MEETING .- A private meeting of the publicans of Sydney, consisting of about forty individuals, took place at the Pulteney Hotel, York street, on Thursday noon last, for the purpose of considering the propriety of petitioning the Legislative Council on the injuries the passing of the New Licensing Act would inflict upon them as a body. Mr. Levien being called to he chair, the business proceeded by Mr. Poole reading the memorial which briefly dwelt upon the injuries they would suistain by the passing in its present form, the Act in question. The meeting then adjourned to the following day, when they at tended and the memorial was signed. Colonel Snodgrass having been requested, presented the same to the Council yesterday; and Roger Therry, Esq., being appointed Counsel for the Association advocated their cause, before His Excellency and the Honorable Members in Council assembled.

We are glad to observe that Mr. J. T. Wilson succeeds so well in his new adventure as an Auctioneer of Sydney. The acknowledged affability of this gentleman—his general knowledge from practical experience, of property entrusted to his charge, together with his spirited and prompt manner, cannot fail of ensuring him a very ex-
