How many of these tag-rag and bob-tail crew will be found remaining under the charge of the Protector, in six months after their removal to Port Phillip, we know not; but we do opine that their numbers WILL NOT INCREASE, and that many will be found wanting; so that this expenditure of public money for the chimerical purpose of making these people useful, will, in all human probability, be expended in waste.
