Flinders' Island Job --- The Aborigines.

By dispatches received from the Colonial Secretary at Van Diemen's Land, addressed to the Colonial Secretary of New South Wales, dated the 22d ultimo, it appears, that the Lieutenant Governor had received a communication from Lord Glenelg, in which his Lordship intimated his desire that the situation of Chief Protector of the Aborigines should be offered to Mr. G. A. Robinson, then in charge of those people at Flinders' Island. That His Excellency, Sir John Franklin, had consequently complied with such instructions" and wow DERFUL OF ALL WONDERS—" that Mr. Robinson had signified his readiness to Ac-CEPT such situation."

The despatch proceeds to state, " that Mr. Robinson was fully empowered to make any arrangement with the Governor of New South Wales, whence he was to proceed in the same ship as conveyed the letter in question. That the government of Van Diemen's Land would contribute in a certain the expenses for maintain ance of the blacks; and that shipping would be procured to convey them to these shores so soon as a place may be fixed on for their location.

This important despatch is accompanied by still more important documents. The first being a written consent, bearing the signature of twenty-nine of these savages, (that is by crosses) testifying on behalf of hemselves and families, that they are willing and desirous of accompanying their com-mandant, G. A. Robinson, to Port Phillip, from whom they do not wish to be separated. And to give this paper an imposing appearance of its consequence, it is accompanied by another bearing the signatures of the Medical Officer, the Storekerper! (who, by the bye, is also catechist, and has requested to be continued in that situation), the Chaplain and the Superintendent, who is the son of the Commandant, and NEW CHOSEN PRO-TECTOR.

Now, touching the JOB altogether, we do not stand alone in holding it up as one of the grossest acts of imposition ever attempted upon the Colony. We have before offered our opinions on that head, and shall therefore confine our remarks to the document

Respecting the signatures, or rather crosses made upon this paper, by twenty-nine individuals out of the eighty-two black fellows now on Flinder's Island, it would not require a conjuror to make out how, or BY WHAT MEANS they have been procured. And supposing for a moment they had been voluntarily tendered, should we not say that these people know (that is if they know any thing) that they are now in a state of bondage—cooped up in an iron bound island— and like the bird in its cage, anxious to be restored to liberty. Would not these people then readily embrace the proffered opportunity, whereby they would be placed in a situation of escaping from their present keepers, to roam about at large, and lead a life more suited to their nature and habits, than be compelled by force and controll to employ themselves in a manner not at all in accordance with their slothful and idle propensities. We should say yes, and in so saying, we are of opinion we should not speak alone.

We next proceed to enquire if any of these black gentlemen who signed this paper, were able to READ what they did sign. 'If not, why what a piece of ostentatious imposition would this paper amount to-a document bearing twenty-nine crosses, made by as many wild natives of Tasmania, who knew no more what they were scribbling upon, except what they might have been told by their masters. Wild beasts in a den would obey their keepers, much less these demi civilized cannibals.

The document above alluded to, of which we have before spoken, follows in these words:---

Flinders' Island, August 12, 1838.

We, the undersigned, certify to having been present when the Commandant this day re-quested the consent of the Aborigines domiciled it this settlement to accompany him to Port cheerful acquiescence in the measure proposed, which afforded them the highest possible satis-

(signed) M. Walsh, Medical Officer. R. CLARKE, Storekeeper. T. Dove, Chaplain

G. A. Robinson, jun. Supt. This document we should at once pronounce altogether needless; for although we are totally unacquainted with any of these sable gentry, we will venture to testify to their perfect willingness and cheerful acquiescence, to be removed from an isolated spot in the sea, to a soil more congenial to their ideas, to one that will afford them ample opportunities to escape into the wilderness. and commit every species of depredation on our civilized community. Nay we will have the confidence to assert, that their keepers themselves, one and all, from the Commandant down to the least man amongst them, would unquestionably prefer the luxuriant soil of Port Phillip, with good salaries, and the social intercourse of their fellow men, to the lonely monotony of Flinders' Island. If they should not, we are no judges of human nature, and will contentedly allow

ourselves to be accounted as blockheads. Subjoined to the foregoing important articles, we find a list of eighty-two aborigines, consisting of as follows:

Male youths 3 Girl.... Female ditto ditto

How many of these tag-rag and bob-tail crew will be found remaining under the charge of the Protector, in six months after their removal to Port Phillip, we know not; but we do opine that their numbers WILL NOT INCREASE, and that many will be found wanting; so that this expenditure of public money for the chimerical purpose of making hese people useful, will, in all human proability, be expended in waste.

In conclusion, we consider the proposal of the Lieutenant Governor of Van Diemen's Land to contribute to their support here in New South Wales, as the strongest proof of his wisdom and policy, removing the burden from the sister Colony and foisting it upon us, and will be the means of saving them the whole cost of the establishment of Flinders' Island, at the expense of our public purse.

THE FACTORY.

This mismanaged receptacle for our female delinquents is, at last, about to be renovated as regards the mode and severity of punishment inflicted within its walls. Upwards of 150 men are employed at the present time in hastening the completion of the cells for the accommoda tion of the more depraved culprits.

His Excellency seems determined to tame, by a new system of discipline, this densely crowded prison house; which, for want of adequate ma nagement, has become a place of desperation and disgust, through the repeated visits of its hardened inmates. Under the management of Mrs. Rell and the assistance of her bushand with the application of the cells as a Factory or econdary punishment after arrival to refractory dames, we hope soon to see much improvement We are much surprised that Mrs. Leach re

tained office so long in such a den, without a male protector, where she suffered the grossest insults and abuse in the tamest manner, after having for many years enjoyed a comparatively peaceable life. Mrs. L., we understand, is the widow of a much respected Missionary, and not being in good circumstances was appointed to this enviable situation; much to th certainly, of the Secretary of the Colonies.

In our last we noticed the decrease in the daily arrivals by the steamer of females for assignment, which we attribute to the enforcement of the regulation requiring the signature of a Clergyman, as well as that of a J. P. to the applications for assigned servants; we think the

regulation highly proper.

The injury done to the morals of children in the houses of whose parents these women have acted as servants, is incalculable, and therefore it does behove the Local Government to do their best towards the moral improvement of these females; for which at present the power both civil and religious, is but indifferently handled.

SEVERAL Bills, amongst them, that relating to the Practice of Medicine in New South Wales, will not be passed into law this Session. We are sorry for it, for the too easy access to practice, of half-bred men of medicine, is one of the greatest evils under which the Colony at present labors. These men delight to administer one day, that medicine or treatment which must be eradicated on the following; thus trifling with our bodies and endangering our lives. There is little doubt, but when a law for the protection of the profession, is passed, that we shall find many talented men willing to embark from the parent country for this Colony.

It is only a few days ago, we were asked if deplomas could be purchased or procured at New Zealand, because it was asserted, an individual who never served his articles, or walked a hospital, had gone from Sydney to Hokianga, or some other part in New Zealand, and has returned with the high sounding title of Doctor, to this Colony, and is now in full practice.

In the case of Mr. Joseph Catteral, to answer the penalty of £50 inflicted by His Honor Judge Burton, last term, while the above defendant was making his defence in a libel case, Mr. Windeyer addressed the Court, but was interrupted by the Attorney-General, who appeared to protect the Crown when anything was advanced to injure the same, and it did appear to the learned Crown officer that his interference was required, as the fine was inflicted for con-tempt of Court on the spot, and was then and there recorded, and therefore could not, as Judge Burton said, be gain sayed, but, continued the carned Judge, if you wish to act in the case, you must show cause why the fine should not be levied, and not show cause why execution should not be issued. The decision, however, was deferred until Mr. Catteral should be brought up for judgment in the case of Captain Adams, of the 80th regiment, v. Joseph Catteral, tried last Term.

Titterton v. Smith .- In this case the Court gave judgment on the demurrer, considering the plea filed last term a bad one, and directed it to be amended. The principal thing argued was, whether a judgment in the Court of West-minster could be taken as a judgment in this Colony, when their Honors decided in the negative.

Walker and others v. Appleton and others .- In this case the Court directed that a non-suit be entered, as it appeared to their Honors the Chief Justice, and Mr. Justice Burton, that a promissory note made in England should be stamped, to make it legal or recoverable in that country, and as such was the case, and the note in question was not written on a stamped paper they were of opinion the document in question could not stand good in this Colony. Mr. Justice Willis was of a different opinion, and read in Court a document of similar import, to bear him

out in that opinion, but failed therein.

Seagerson v. Gray.—Mr. Justice Willis, in this case, according to the prayer of the plaintiff, ordered a specific performance of the coutract.

Mr. E. L. Boyce, was then enrolled among the Barristers of the Supreme Court.

In the cases Walker v. Hughes. — v. Terry. Manning v. Grose, and Scott v. Dight, special

James Andlegark, and William and Stephen Pierce, convicted of riot and assault during the last sessions, were brought up, when the Chief Justice read over the evidence, sentenced each to pay a fine of £5, and ordered them to find sureties for their good behaviour for twelve months. The Attorney-General applied for a rule, call-

ing upon Mr. William Williams, to show cause why an attachment should not be issued against him, for causing to be published in the Austra lian, of the 16th August last, a libel upon Mr.
Justice Burton. Mr. Williams said that the
letter in question was written when his passions were greatly excited, but bearing that he had misunderstood the proceedings of His Honor, that led to the libel in question, he was exceed-ingly sorry for having so acted. The Attorney General withdrew his motion at the request o the Court, the regret of Mr. W. being thought by Mr. Justice Burton perfectly sincere, and feeling confident that his character, although assailed, was not injured by the publication of

After a few unimportant motions having been gone through, the Court adjourned to Monday.

THE SEAMAN'S FARCE!-Yesterday fourteen seamen attached to the ship Lord Lyndock, were brought upon warrant before the Bench, to answer the charge of their captain, for refusing to do duty a lew days ago, for which offence they were ordered by the Bench to be mulct of eight day's pay, being double the number of days they had been absent from the said ship. The Bench stated that the punishment inflicted was made thus light in order to induce them to return with a proper feeling to their duty; but one and all declared that they would not handle a rope even if they went on board; and one that he would sooner be imprisoned for six months. It is high time the Merchant's Seumen's Act was remodelled as regards this Colony.

ESTREATING RECOGNIZANCES .-- It will be seen by our Supreme Court proceedings of Saturday last, that the recognizances in the cases of John Darbyshire, and Isaac Williams, were ordered to be estreated, in the former case for the appearance of John Darbyshire, the sureties were bound in the sum of £100 each, and in the latter, for the appearance of Isaac Williams the sureties were bound in the sum of £50 each. Their names are for the former, George Payne and Peter Workman,—and for the latter, John Collitt and James Darby. It will be necessary in future for parties to be very careful for whom they bind themselves as sureties.
