#### Informations.

The Business of the Police Court has been much occupied during the latter part of the week with cases of much interest commonly called " Informations."

It is our intention in these few hasty lines to speak of the merits of the cases in question, and of the parties by, or through, whom these informations were laid by our Chief Constable, Mr. Mitchell.

Police Incidents.

REGINA v. JAMES ROBERTS.—The defendant in this case is an eating house keeper in Pict-street. The information field by the Chief Constable at the instigation of George Everton, the recently arrived Port Ptallip Informer, and Serjeant Price, his willing colleague, was for retail ing a bottle of ale contrary to the Act of th Governor and Coancil. It appeared that this informer went into the house of Roberts on Saturday evening last, in company with a friend named M'Greggor, and having crammed down sundry slices of hum and beef, called for a bottle of ale, for which he put down two shillings and Serjeant Price stated that he being to the intention of Everton's visit to Ro berts's shop, watched outside, and saw defendant take the said bottle from under the counter, and when the cork was drawn, entered, and partock of a glass of the beverage. Mr. Roberts stated that he purchased the ale from Johnson's, next door, and went out of the back parlour, it bems at that time more convenient. Mr. Johnson or being called, stated that Roberts did at the time laid in the information, come into his house, and purchased a bottle of ale, which he was in the habit of doing, and paid him one shifting and ninepence. Mr. R. stated that the difference was tendered to Everton but he declined taking it, thinking the waiter, no doubt, was entitled o a few pence for his trouble. REGINA v STONE ... In this case Mr. Sydney Stephen appeared for the defendant Stone, wh is also an cating house keeper, a few doors from Roberts'. REGINA v. AARON .- In this case Mr. Windeyer appeared for the de endant, Mr. Aaron, who is an extensive dealer, in Castiereagh-street. It ap extensive dealer, in Castlereagn sacce. It appeared that on Thursday, the 13th instant, Everton being directed to the house of Mr. Aaron by Mr. Price, went to the landlady of the house, Mr. A. being out at the time, and enquired if he could lodge there for a short time, as he had just conferen Port Phillip. He was pressured in the affirmative and required to answered in the affirmative, and required to have a snack of bread and chiese. During the mastication of this dry and unsavory food, he begged Mrs. A. to send for some porter, or halfand half, for which he gave her son, an intelliand half, for which he gave her son, an intentigent lad, sixpence.
