

We have called this an oppressive Act, and will endeavour to prove it is so. A gentleman of our acquaintance having occasion to break out a small window into his own back yard from his dwelling, commenced the work accordingly, when Mr. surveyor walked in, measured the building, and sent in his claim for £1 15s, because an altera tion was made. The claim was paid, and the builders charge for the sash, glazing, painting &c., was under three poinds. The surreyor produced the Act and in the 5th and 6th clause it states, or any alteration or addition thereto, and so made his claim good. We are also in formed that no person can set a grate in his parlour without paying this surveyor his fee, or if we require a store in our office, and have a funnel to go through our back wall, we must pay this surveyor £1 15s, to be allowed the indulgence; so that according to the wording of this clause, if we wish for French window olinds to our parlour windows above the Co lonade in Bridge-street, we must pay £1 15s. for this too; for it is decidedly an addition to the building. We therefore say that if this Act must be passed, let the Council decide what chall be an additional alteration. We likewise can see great fault, or otherwise we distinguish some Fire Office policy, about the thickness of party walls; and we would ask the Committee of the Council how many Directors of the Fire Office were examined? For why should we be compelled to build eighteen inch party walls between our own properties-in external walls we might agree to it. Again, if a man in middling circumstances wishes to erect a cottage for his family to contain four rooms on the ground floor only, he must have 25 brick footings, with 18 inch walls, the cost of which com-pletely put it out of his power to build at all. We would likewise ask the Conneil why should this Act extend to the Surry Hills, or the back streets of the town, or compel an individual to build a stable, when he requires it, that will cost him some hundred pounds,—why not let proprietors erect what they please at the rear of their respective premises. It is enough for the Council to enforce a uniformity of build ings in the principal streets, for how can they imagine that it is requisite to enforce the Lonall occasions with a bad grace. Penrith Police.

MONDAY, 17th SEPTEMBER, 1838.-Before D. Dunlop, Esq., Police Magistrate. — Kain an assigned servant to Mr. Charles Thompson of Penrith, was put to the bar, charged by his master with absenting himself without leave. Mr. Thompson stated that the prisoner asked his permission to attend Mass on the day previous (Sunday) which he did not comply with, as it would interfere with his do-mestic arrangements, he being his cook; that notwithstanding he absented himself without leave; and on he, Mr. T., going towards Pen-rith to look after him, found him talking with some of his companions on the high road and gave him in charge—that he, Mr. T., had no lisposition to prevent the prisoner attending Divine Worship, but under the above circumstances, as he had almost invariably given his servants the permission when requested.—The Rev. Jo. O'Brady here interrupted Mr. T., quoting Scripture against his prohibition on the above occasion, which the Police Magistrate terminated abruptly-stating that he was sorry he had allowed such irrelevant discussion at all Sentenced 50 lashes and returned.

THURSDAY, 20th instant. - The Police Magistrate called Constable Wheatley before the Court, and questioned him whether he had not some time since been fined both at Parramatta and Liverpool for harbouring a female prisoner and Interpool of harmouring a lemate prisoner of the crown. Wheatley acknowledged that he had been imposed on in recommending his appointment as a Constable, for had he known that he had been fined for harbouring a runaway prisoner, he never would have admitted him into the Police. The Constable stated that he had suffered for his offence, and that he knew that it was the Chief Constable of Parramatta had made the representation in order to injure him. and who was in the habit of corresponding with the female prisoner alluded to. His Worship stated that he considered such defence as an aggravation of his case, and he therefore directed his dismissal. FRIDAY, 21st instant .- Mr. John Single ap-

Roe then advanced to Mr. S. and struck him, violently with a curry comb on the nose which cut him severely—and then repeated the blows several times with his fists. Warrant issued for Roe's apprehension.
