### Mr. Blaxland's Protests.

In our last we made a few hasty remarks upon the protests made by Mr. Blaxland in Council, on Thursday the 20th ultimo, touching certain items in the Estimates of Expenditure for the ensuing year; but it was far from our intention there to let the tody on the master's warrant for absenting subject drop.

With regard to the two items already noticed, viz. for the Mounted Police Establishment and the British Resident's Salary at New Zealand, we certainly are of opinion that the latter might be entirely of the Bench in their proceedings in the done away with, and the former could well be reduced full one-half, by studying eco nomy, and dispensing with the gaudy and unnecessary trappings of the men and the horses: such absurd and foolish additions to the outfit of a mounted policeman being perfectly useless in intimidating the desperate bushranger. Why should the public be put to this expense purely to gratify the pride of the parties concerned \_£22,976! -The sum rings in our ears till our indignation can hardly be controlled from stigmatising that government which can impose such a monstrous tax upon an infant and striving land-upon a land only just upon its legs. The other items protested against are equally unjust with those above mentioned, particularly that relating to the sum of £250 as a pension to the ex-Colonial Secretary, or £1750 bonus in lieu of the yearly pension. What great services has this gentleman done for the Colony, for which he has not been fully paid? Why should he, at the expiration of his services to the public expect a pension like the above, when while in office his salary was even then greater than the amount of his services, - to say nothing of its being larger in amount than that received by any previous officer in the same situation, or than the salary paid for the services of our present Colonial Secretary, whose duties

laily increase. With regard to this protest, a very worthy and impartial (?) contemporary ("whose days are dwindling to the shortest span,") seems to be much annoyed, particularly as no protest was made by Mr. Blaxland against the pension of the late Chief Justice Forbes.

Our brother of the sapient race of public writers, must know that there are just as well as unjust actions to be laid to the charge of the powers that be. Now, our candid opinion is, that in comparison with the M'Leay pension, the late Chief Justice's pension is just:-compare the constant and arduous duties of an officer of this kind, with those of the Colonial Secretary, and judge whether the late Chief Justice is not more entitled, if entitled they either be (for we do not hold in the propriety of allowing pensions, except in very particular cases), to a pension for underpaid services, than the wealthy Mr. M'Leay. Mr. Forbes, in comparison with Mr. M'Leay, is poor-he had not sufficient time upon his hands to feather his nest. He had quite enough to do without plodding in business unconnected with his calling, and therefore took no thought for the morrow, save where it concerned the well-being of the public, whose servant he was-and as such. having done his duty with strict impartiality, devoting his whole time to the services of the public, at a salary not at all sufficient to maintain the dignity of his office, in comparison with that of Mr. M'Leay, the home government bave thought him enti-

tled to a pension; and such is our conclu-

sion, being of opinion that his health was

much impaired by his close application to the duties of his office, for the public good. There is no doubt Mr. Blaxland saw the justice of an allowance to our late Chief at the Penrith Police Office, since Mr. Dunlop's Justice, and as a matter of course, did not appointment in a ratio of two thirds-what

protest against his conscience. But the worthy contemporary above alluded to, would fain attribute the protest against Mr. M'Leay's pension as guided by a partial and party feeling. Let him look at home, and say if it is not the same spirit that induces him to make mention of the late Chief Justice's pension.

We stated that the men had been sentenced by the Bench to receive each the above punishment, and not that they had actually been flogged. There is no doubt that the senterce would have been carried into effect; but for the interference of the Press, in holding up such proceedings to public

If this be not the reason for the sentence not having been carried into effect, perhaps, our contemporary will state what was. It certainly is very extraordinary that the Bench in the Free Court should direct these men to be dealt with in the Prisoners' Court for the minor offence,-viz: abscondingand that they should be sentenced to a punishment by the Magistrate sitting in that Court, which is not carried into effect. The Magistrates in question may see the wisdom of such preceedings; but we cannot. Suppose an indented servant were to absent himself from his employment, and the master were to make a charge and procure a warrant for his apprehension; and, again, supposing that man during his absence had committed a murder, which was known when he might be taken into cushimself from his indented service,-would our wise Bench deal first with the master's complaint, and then deal with the charge of murder against the same individual We think not. Then were was the wisdom above case?

### English News.

By the arrival of the Coromandel with Emigrants, we are put in possession of Cork papers to 8th June, from which we shall extract largely in our next. For the present we shall only lay before our readers the following few paragraphs in consequence of the late hour of our receiving the above papers.

The Coronation of Queen Victoria the First, was positively to take place on the 28th June, for which preparations were being made in town and country, on a ment is known by its desire to promote the scale equal to those of a similar character (From the Cork Standard, May 23.)

Prince Talleyrand is dying. The la counts state his condition to be hopeless. The last ac Russia is sending a squadron to the Dar-danelles, to observe the movements of the French, English, and Turkish fleets; it consists of four ships of war of 84 guns, three frigates of 60 guns, two brigs, and 2 armed steamers.

A letter from Odessa states that a camp of observation is forming at Anapa, consisting of 25,000 men. It is supposed that this army is destined for Persia.

The Toulonnaise mentions the shipwreck of the English war brig, the Rapid, off Cape Bon, on her way back to Malta. The crew and the whole material had been saved, and conveyed back to Malta on board a merchant vessel. Serious dissensions had broken out in the army of Don Carlos.

The accounts from Brazil are very favourable. Bahia fell into the hands of the Imperialists on the 16th of March, and the blockade was consequently raised.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer's financial

statement is considered in the City a most lame and impotent affair.
