It is Excellency the Governor is pleased to I. I. direct that the general objects of the following Bill, now under consideration of the Legislative Council, be published for general

By His Excellency's command, E. DEAS THOMSON.

A Bill for the more effectual appropriation of Fines and Penalties, in certain cases, in the Colonu of New South Wales."

Whereas there are many Statutes in force within the Realm of England, the provisions of which it is expedient and necessary should be applied in the administration of justice in New South Wales, but which have been declared to be inapplicable thereto, by reason of the Fines, Forfeitures, and Penalties therein respectively specified, being directed to be appropriated for the use or on behalf of the Poor of the Parish, Township, or place respectively.—In remedy, whereof, it is proposed—That whenever any Statutes in force within the realm of England, and adopted and applied in the administration of justice in the Colony of New Sorth Wales, shall direct the appropriation of any Forfeiture, Penalty, or som of money, for the use of the Poor of the Parish, or Township, or other place, the same shall be paid to the Treasurer or other authorised officer of the Benevolent Society, for the relief of such poor persons within the said Colony, as are unable to support themselves; and it is further proposed to protect Justices and others, from all proceedings for any acts done before the passing the proposed Law.

FASHIONS FOR JUNE, 1838.

(From the London and Paris Magazine of Fashion.) Shot silks are very fashionable in Paris this season, of lively colours, and are used for dresses a points with flounces and mantelet of the same. All colours are selected of delicate hues—grey in every shade is worn, sometimes stripes of two

shades of grey.

Flounces and wide sleeves are very general, those a la Jardiniere seem the only ones used at this moment, the principle difference in them consisting of the ornaments at the top, and their being more or less wide at the wrist.

The corsages of redingotes are sometimes full, sometimes plain behind, but the fronts are always en coeur, and the echancrure is cut rather low and if in muslin or jaconet, trimmed with two rows of lace or tulle. Low bodies are made of a similar form. Buckles are gone by, the bodies being attached to the skirts by liserees, and when a ceinture is used on a peiquoir it fastens with gold or covered buttons. Ceinture with long ends are worn in dress The skirts seem to increase in width but are a little shorter. Some short sleeves have loose ones of blonde or tulle attached to the marchette, and finished with a wristband the same as the dress. The black silk shawls have rather yeilded to

those of colour-but black mantelets and scarfs are among the indispensables this season, and are trimmed with lace, fringe, frills, bouillons, ruches, &c. Mantelets and shawls of muslin, lined and trimmed with lace, are also fashionable. Bonnets of paille de rız and sılk are worn small low at the ears and shorter over the forehead -ruches are very general round the edge: Leghorn bonnets do not vary much in size. Car-potes a coulisses have wider runners, which are placed farther apart. Carpotes of crape, with ruches of tulle, are very light and elegant—also

of muslin, lined or not For silk capotes white, or light colours shot with white are the most fashionable.
