The Slerne is fast filling up for the Bay of Islands, at the Queen's Wharf, and is expected to haul out into the stream to-morrow.

Mr. Grant.

It appears by a correspondence with one of our contemporaries that this gentleman has given offence to divers hard task-masters in the neighbourhood of the Hunter, in consequence of his not having punished some assigned servants whether they were guilty or not, but allowed them to enter into defence,

As far as the article itself goes, we consider it more as a compliment to the justice and humanity of the worthy magistrate than any thing else. Mr. Grant has had the firmness to act independently, and withstanding the frequent attempts through the anti-convoict Journal to bounce him from his system, we are happy to find that he still continues to act in such a manner as must insure him the admiration of all true lovers of justice to the great dismay of mercenary slave drivers, refugees or escapees who might have obtained a passage into this colony at the expense of government, if they had been possessed of a little more patience.

But times are altered now—rulers at home have viewed with disgust and horror the cruelties formerly practised upon the prison population, when our fellow creatures (had as they were) were cut to pieces without trial or evidence, let alone being allowed a defence, and convicted upon a mere scrawl, on a dirty piece of paper from a master to his friend on the next bench, desiring the worthy magistrate to give him 50 or 100 (not pounds). The feelings of real Englishmen were appalled by such modes of treatment, and our late Governor Sir Richard Bourke brought the memorable bill into Council, which modified and altered the law and by so doing has left behind him, the strongest and most indubitable proof of his humanity and goodness. Our present Governor has not been behind hand with Sir Richard Bourke in point of goodness, humanity, or feeling; for he has finished what the former began; and by the mode adopted by him, the prison population are not only likely to reform themselves, but to become of much more service to such masters as treat them liberally, than if they were goaded on by the lash.

With respect to Mr. Grant, he may rest assured that his conduct and actions as a Public officer, will always insure him the respect of gentlemen possessing the true spirit of humanity, and whilst he is courted and caressed by the respectable part of the community he may laugh to scorn all attempts to bring him into obloquy; let him but persist in his present line of conduct, he will receive the praise of christians, and the thanks of his fellow countrymen. By blending humanity with justice, and trampling on tyranny, he will and must enjoy all that happiness of mind and pleasure of heart ever attendant on good and just actions.—Let him justly, honestly, and impartially administer the laws of his country, but let it be always attended with mercy, and we venture to suggest that the milder course will be found to answer every purpose, in preference to severity, tyranny, and oppression.

"Australicus."

A third time has the writer on the subject of the Land Loan made his bow to the public, exhorting them to oppose this destructive proceeding of a party or company in the mother country, which proceeding has been laid at the door of our government leaders, but majestically so; they do quite enough evil to the colony, without the actions of a few government rats being palmed upon them.

The following is the Circular alluded to above, which we think our readers, as well as all sensible people, will read with eagerness:—

(CIRCULAR.)

The Report of the Select Committee of the House of Commons on Transportation has been published! The fact is confirmed! The abolition of Transportation, and the scheme of creating a National Debt for this Colony, by means of a Loan, originated in England and not here, as pretended; and have one common paternity

—the political adventurers and others, proprietors of the Province of South Australia, and of the similar Colonial Land Companies, either in actual existence, or in contemplation.

The tenderer and object of the two projects are of the same description also. That of the abolition, to deprive the Colonists of convict labour—and thus, primarily, to reduce this splendid Colony to a level with their own Province;—Secondarily, to create a panic; so that, during the confusion, we may be induced to incur this fatal Debt.

While the principal tendency and object of the Loan itself are to saddle us with a National Debt, greater infinitely, for this Colony, than that of England for the Parent Country,—and thus, primarily, to obtain the entire possession of the Waste Lands of the Colony;—and secondarily, to destroy this Colony, or depress it, is a point of Immigration, below their own Province or Provinces, by a taxation for the payment of the interest of a Debt, from which their own Province or Provinces would be exempt.

The operation of the means proposed for these ends is as follows:—The loss of convict labour would not be replaced by other labour even if the sixty thousand families, talked of by those who put their faith in this Loan, should come out; but, as we may conclude, from those Emigrants which have already arrived, the want of labourers, for some years, would be rather increased than diminished by their arrival. In so far, by the first operation of this project, this Colony would at once be reduced to a level with the present one; and if, therefore, the Estimates of the Colony had ever exceeded the Revenues of the Colony by 40 per cent, it is clear that the Colonists would be utterly unable, when still further reduced in their means, to pay the interest of the Loan; viz. about £125,000 annually in addition.—Nor would their creditors demand it. This, for the first few years, is no part of their project: they would merely demand permission to pay themselves out of the Waste Lands, and exercised by the Port Stephens Agricultural Company) of selecting their Land in such portions as they pleased—and at their own price. Let them do this (which they would in spite of us), and in the course of three or four years, they would have drawn a cordon, consisting of their newly acquired purchase, extending completely as far as every inch of available land is concerned, from their Provincial Empire of South Australia, including the whole of the Australia Felix, to the province or possessions of their colleagues at Port Stephens; together with every claim of desirable land possession, not actually granted, within our own limits.

Satiate with Land, it is now that, for first time, the interest of this debt would be demanded in cash payments. Tax would have to be added to tax, with fresh supplementary loans, and supplementary taxes—merely for the payment of the interest of the original debt and of these additional loans. The fate of the Colony would now be sealed. Emigrants from taxation at home—as would the Colonists fly from a worse taxation here. The new Provinces, both those now in existence, and those in contempla-

tion, would be too happy to open their arms to receive them. Distress would be followed by desertion—and Lancaster at present worth £1000 an acre would be dear at any price!

The fate of Venice (under the step-paragraph), and of Trieste (under the real paragraph, and of New South Wales (under the step-paragraph of the South Australian, and other Land Jobbing, Proprietors); and of Adelaide (under the real paragraph) of those wretched (under the real paragraph) States in every thine; and of a thousand other States, would be acted, over again, similarly circumstanced, would be acted, over again with similar results.

We wish them a successful season.

FAST TRAVELLING.—What would our Australian youths say to a journey of five days to visit the land where their fathers were born—Old England! A steam carriage in England, a short time ago, is reported to have run a distance of twelve miles in five minutes on a rail road from Sydney to London, computing the distance at seventeen thousand miles, we should be able to reach the great metropolis in little more than four days.

LAW MAKERS ARE LAW BREAKERS.—On Saturday last, while two gentlemen were walking along Elizabeth street, arm-in-arm, their further progress in that fashion was arrested by the Attorney-General's carriage, which the coachman had drawn up so far on the pathway as to compel the gentlemen to separate, and with difficulty one at a time was able to squeeze by. The coachman, on being spoken to by one of the gentlemen for being on the foot path, and obstructing their passage, in an insolent tone referred the complaint to the Attorney-General and did not offer to budge an inch, until he saw the same complainant a short distance off directing the attention of a constable to the shameful circumstance, when he turned the horses about, and came to a stand nearly in the middle of the road. Who will say after this, that the sight of a constable does no good, to say nothing of a threat to imprison in a watch-house? The Attorney-General for the fault of his coachman deserves to be fined. Why should he not be fined as well as a poor barrow-man for obstructing the foot path? Because, the informer would say, it is more than his situation is worth.

Two boys named Joseph Ballock, and John Gordon, late apprentices to Samuel Onions, framemonger of King-street, were taken into custody on Monday last by the Chief Constable, in consequence of a caution appearing in the Government Gazette, requiring the said boys, with Martin Quinn, who is not yet taken, to return to the Orphan School from whence they were apprenticed. The above two boys were put to the bar, the three others had done nothing morally wrong, and were remanded by the Bench for further examination, to be kept in custody, but they might be together. Now the parents of these children, or their near relations were in Court, and why did not the Bench hand them over to their keeping till their appearance was required on the following morning? The total amount of women and children is now eight hundred and forty-nine. A good round number for Mr. "Physiologist" to march into the interior for the edification of the Blacks!
