There is a great number of most useful mechanics still out of employment in Hobart Town, where there is not at present one single new building in progress The Tasmanians will soon be able to get a passage to Port Phillip at a very trifling expence, (perhaps only £2) by means of a steam vessel, which is daily expected to arrive at Launceston from England, to be employed exclusively in conveying passengers and live stock between those settlements .-Bent's News, October 12.

M.—On Saturday last, as a man was giving his evidence relative to the finding of stolen property in the possession of a prisoner at the bar, he stated that the prisoner was taken into custody "in the rum puncheon," "in the sign of the Rum Puncheon, you mean, I suppose," said the exact magistrate:—"it would be rather intemperate to find a man concealed in a rum puncheon, particularly if any of that intoxicating liquor was therein."

DRUNKARDS .- On Thursday last, only two cases of drunkenness came before the Bench; something very extraordinary considering the dry state of the weather.

CAUTION TO EMIGRANTS .- A man named John Herley, was sentenced to two months hard labor in the House of Correction on Tuesday last, for absconding from his hired service. The defence the prisoner put in was, that as he could not agree with his master, he thought it best to part; and stated that he had a brother lately come to the Colony, a prisoner, for whom he wished to do something.

IMPROVEMENTS BY THE COLONEL .- A few mornings back the constant visitors to the Police Office, were not a little surprised to see, nounted on clerical brazen branches, two cedar mounted on ciercal orazen branches, two cedar toast-racks, on either side the Colonel's Bench; but instead of toast, the worthy first P. M. was obliged to satisfy himself with half sheets of Foolscap, which he now and then tried to digest, but found the recommendation. but found the necessary organs for such a purpose perfectly out of tune, having slept but little the night previous; and he therefore retired in the midst of the examination of a prisoner, to the consternation of the second M., who was regaling himself over the News of the Morning." If Governor Gipps would but create a fourth paid Magistrate for Sydney, to act us a spy upon the doings of the three now in office, much benefit might result therefrom.

Van Diemen's Land.

By the arrival of the schooner Marian Watson, we have received Hobart Town Journals to the 19th instant.

It appears that the Vandemonian Government are endeavouring to prohibit distillation in their Colony, which proceeding has greatly surprised the inhabitants, particularly those intimately connected with such matters. We are not at all surprised at the inconsistent moves of our Government which are put in motion by the same hand in the parent country as those of the Government of Van Diemen's Land: let them be content awhile, and, as the Frenchman says -" we shall see what we shall see." There is no doubt a great change in their Government, as well as ours, will ere long, take place; and then the peoples' voice may have some wait.

The following are a few of the most interesting extracts from the latest of the papers received:-

THE BUSHRANGERS .- The two men named Beard & Fisher, who have for so long a time been at large, committing depredations upon the inhabitants about Evandale and the New River, at tempted to force an entrance into the house of Mr. Whitchurch, at Wooley Hut Marsh, on Saturday night last. They "gave notice" (it seems that Bushrangers as well as Parsons "give notice" occasionally) that they intended to pay Mr. Glover, of Benlomond, a visit on Sunday morning. What is the Government about to permit these lawless vagabonds to be so long at large. - Chronicle.

DR. BROWNE .- Murray's Review, of next week has promised to insert a letter, received from Launceston, in reference to the conduct of the Rev. Dr. Browne, in denouncing the Prees from the pulpit, whereby the Reverend Gentleman insinuates that Captain Goodwin, the Editor of the Cornwall Chronicle, has been instrumental in the cause of the sudden death of Mrs. Friend, Murray's Review very truly asserts, that "we never heard of worse taste, to say nothing more."

ROMAN CATHOLICS.—A Northern contempora ry says, that the Government has come to the conclusion of withholding from the minister the usual salary allowed from the Colonial Revenue to all ministers of religion, according to the provisions of an Act of Council, because it considers the building the Roman Catholics have recently erected in Launceston, is not a Chapel. We have heard that the Rev. J J Therry, Roman Catholic Clergyman of Hobart Town, has also had his sa lary withheld from him, for a similar reason we believe:—and that this much esteemed Reverend Gentleman is in consequence, we hear, about to return to New South Wales, where he has been a resident upwards of 18 years, and where he is universally beloved and respected.

The Lieutenant Governor has issued a procla mation for dividing the island into districts, for the purpose required by the Act of Council for the; Registration of Births, Deaths, and Marriages and in the Gazette of next week will appear the pointed Registrars for carrying into effect the objects of the enactment. In the meantime we can jects of the enactment. In the meantime we can inform our readers on good authority, that Mr. C. B. Lyons is appointed Registrar General for the whole island, as well as deputy Registrar for the Hobart Town district, and that Mr. Fryett who was recently displaced from the office of Landing Waiter in the Customs' Department at Launces-ton, has been offered by His Excellency, the office of Deputy Registrar for the district of Launceston.—Bent's News.

South Australia.

By the arrival of the Hope from Port Adelaide, we learn that Colonel Gawler, the new Governor, had arrived to take the reins of Government. It is to be hoped that with his accession all political squabbles will cease. Two hundred emigrants arrived in the Pestonjee Bomanjee with the Governor, and three hundred on the previous day in the Surry.

The following we extract from the South Australian Record, London Journal, of April 11th :-Lieutenant Colonel Gawler, late of the 52nd Regiment, has been appointed to succeed Captain Hindmarsh as Governor of South Australia.

"Colonel Gawler is one of the most distinguished officers of the British army. He was present at several of the Duke of Wellington's great seiges and general actions, viz. Badajoz, Vittoria, Nive, Nivelle, Orthes, Toulouse, and Waterloo. He volunteered the storming purty at Badajoz, and commanded the right flank company of the 52nd Regt. during the great charge on the Imperial Guards at Waterloo. Colonel Gawler is distinguished for high intellectual attainments, as well as for gallantry in the field. At the mili-tary college be stood first in mathematics; and some tracts which he has published are written in a style remarkable for perspicuity and force.

" From his acquaintance with the mechanical and plysical sciences, and from the attention he has given to the principles of government and of political economy, he seems peculiarly fitted to call forth the resources of a new colony; while his character for calm determination and temperate vigour appears as it were, especially adapted to extinguish dissensions and party feuds; and, to borrow his own happy expression, bring all authorities and parties in the colony to act together in the mighty energy of mutua confidence.

"Captain S. Gawler, of the 73rd Regiment, father of Colonel Gawler, the new Governor, was killed at the head of the Granadiers of his Regiment in close conflict with the enemy, by a spear wound, in the storming of Fort Mug-gerall, in the Mysore, in December, 1804."
