The Black Sheep of the Law.

According to our promise in our last number we now enter into our labours in exposing the system, practice, and chicanery carried on in this Colony by some of the legal fraternity; and in so doing, we feel the full weight of the displeasure which we shall have to encounter from the all powerful engines of the Law. We have since our last been bullied, soothed, and threatened, but we shall fearlessly proceed notwith-standing: we require no favor, nor shall we give any. We lay ourselves open if we do wrong, and will abide by our acts, stand or fall. But we beg to assure those who may look out for the chance of catching us asleep, that we know the law as well as tuemselves, and although we may proceed as near the mark as possible, we shall not go

We shall in the first place commence by saving a few words on the practice adopted by some of the Law Gentlemen, for the purpose of making some costs for themselves, little caring one jot about the plaintiff, or whether he may be able to get his debt or not. We shall inform the public in what manner they may put these people not in a situation of annoying them, and in what manner they may appear to writs or summonses in their proper persons, at an expense of a few shillings, saving themselves the costs of paying lawyers, (we beg pardon, attornies) from three to four pounds, merely to get a short respite till the following

Our next course will be to shew the understanding existing between some of the genlemen of the legal profession as to actions brought against them by strangers, either on book debts or Bills of exchange, and in what manner they accommodate each other, so that plaintiffs gain nothing by going to law with them but long delays and utter disappointment.

By the late rules of Court, Summonses may be made returnable at any time, and the parties bound to appear in four days, in cases where actions are brought on Bills of Exchange or Promissory Notes, and in eight days in other cases. The rule heretofore in force allowing summonses to be made returnable on a certain day, one month before the first day of term being altogether superseded. The intention of this rule was no doubt to meet many inconveniences, which in days gone by have occurred in cousequence of persons quitting the Colony after the service and before the return of the process. But we think the change of practice has in no wise benefitted the suitor. An attornev issues a summons on one day returnable the next, and the party has four days to appear and plead. If he does this, the case goes over until the next term, and then in what manner is the plaintiff forwarded or assisted in his suit? The attorney alone reaps the benefit, for he is in a situation upon the return day, to charge for declaration and other fees which may amount to five or six pounds, whilst the simple costs of the summons il debt and costs were paid before the return day would only account to about thirty shil-

lings if taxed. We consider the practice to operate ill in two ways-first, in cases where an honest defendant should through disappointments, be unfortunate enough to be sued because he could not pay at the day, and in the next by a dishonest defendant being in a situation to defeat a plaintiff by appearing and pleading to the process; in which case the plaintiff's proceedings would be suspended until he might make his exit from the Colony. On the other hand it would be putting an honest debtor to considerable cost from the circumstance of the hasty return of the summons. SUPREME COURT .- When the case Tucker v.

Daris, was coming on for trial last Monday week Elizabeth-street was thronged with drays and wheelbarrows, which circumstance the illiterate and illegal gazers could not comprehend, neither could the new chums of the law, until they saw behind each train (for there were two distinct trains) a limb of the law, arrayed in all the trappings of court, and carrying each some twenty or thirty volumes, which it was found quite impossible to place upon these vehicles As soon as these two limbs of the law had conveved their volumes into Court, the Judges having anticipated an easy day's work, fell back in consternation, when the monument of law books was erected on the table in their front. Some said Judge Willis swooned, others that he was in a brown study, as to whether he should make a bolt, and leave the arduous daty of deciding between the legal tact of Messrs. Stephen and Windeyer. But whatever was said or thought, came far short of the truth, for the case was heard by the three Judges, and judgment passed to the satisfaction of one, if not both, of the voluminous barristers.

A seaman named James Watson, late of the other day, under the following circumstances:it appeared in evidence that the prisoner had called in company with the rest of the crew of the brig Argo to regale themselves on bread, cheese, and beer, at the "Royal Oak, Miller's Point," at the expense of the chief officer. Shortly after they had retired, the prisoner returned in company with a woman, and asked for something to drink, but wanted tick, which Mr. Bond positively refused to give, knowing well that Watson had money. THE REVENUE.—It appears by the last Quarterly Abstract of the Revenue of this Colony, ending 30th ult. as compared with the corresponding quarter in 1837, that a decrease of no less than £14,830, 4s 11¼d has taken place. The decrease under the head of Crown Lands is no less than £9,580 6s 5d, and that of Customs £7,320, 19s 0d. The Customs at Port Phillip shows an increase of £86 16s 5d. The Crown Lands at the same settlement has added to our Revenue £4,678 3s 10d; and licenses to lepasture stock on the Crown Lands there £130. The amount for licenses to retail spirits in the Colony shows a decrease of £2,160 10s.

Various statements naving open circulated regarding the circumstances attending Captain Maconochie's leaving Government House, it is believed that a service will be done to the community by inserting the following on good authority. Captain Maconochie's imputed offence was him to be a service accompanied actain official papers on his having accompanied certain official papers on convict discipline, which the Lieutenant Governor forwarded, with others, to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, with a non-official letter, and summary of their contents, addressed to a gentleman high in office in England, with a request, that should there be no impropriety in such a course, that they might be communicated to the Secretary of State for the Home Department. His object in doing this was to obtain for his views in the latter quarter, to which the subject peculiarly belonged, a consideration on principle, apart from the details with which in the former quarter they were necessarily connected. But His Excellency conceives that disrespect has his Excellency conceives that disrespect has been thus shown and advantages taken both of himself and the department with which he corresponds; and it is a matter of great regret to Captain Maconochie that conduct which he then thought, and still thinks, may be excused, if not justified, by the circumstances in which he was placed, and the motive which guided him, should even by possibility, be open to an interpretation which he did not think of at the time, and which would make it unjustifiable in any circumstances whatever. His Excellency has mingled much personal kindness with his displeasure; but he has made no overtures to Captain Maconochie unsuited to his high station or incompatible with his continued dissatisfaction on the above point. And Captain Maconochie has not yet had the bad taste or bad feeling, to reject any that have been nade. In his obse of the existing penal system, of which he thinks very ill, Captain Maconochie presumed not to call in question the moral conduct of his fellow colonists. He has made no statement, whatever, which could, he thinks, justify personal offence being taken any where; and he courts rather than fears, the publication of all he has written on the subject, on the spot, where its accuracy can be best tested. But on the particular point of moral decorum he has not spoken at all .-Murray's Review, Oct. 9.

LAUNCH OF THE SIR GEORGE ARTHUR.

(From the Courier.)

On Tuesday last, the very gratifying sight of the launch of a vessel of considerable magni-tude was witnessed at Kangaroo Point. This ship, which we noticed a few weeks since as being in a very forward state, has been nearly being in a very forward state, has been nearly two years in building, from a model by Mr. Johnson. She is the largest vessel which has been built in this or any of the Australian co-lonies, and reflects the highest credit upon the spirited proprietor, Mr. Petchey, and all concerned. Her dimensions are as follows:— Length of keel, 83 feet 6 inches; extreme beam, 30 feet 1 inch; depth of hold, 21 feet 6 inches; imperial register, 387 tons. As a work of colonial art and industry, we cannot look upon her without a feeling of proud satisfaction. We behold in her, and the Maria which was launched a few months back, the commencement of a colonial navy, which, we hope, is destined to rank high in generations yet to come. In it we behold not only a suitable and profitable employment for a large portion of native youths, but a sure and certain means of giving trade, commerce, and ultimate prosperity

o Van Diemen's Land. With a healthy and emperate climate, our native seamen reared in the merchant service, will be robust and hearty
—active and daring. Our insular position affords us the advantages of an unlimited extenlords us the advantages of an unfillified exten-sion of commercial intercourse; and we doubt not that the enterprising spirit of many indi-viduals in the colony will ere long reap a sub-stantial benefit from the intermediate commerce stantial benefit from the intermediate commerce which may be carried on between the various countries and islands scattered over the vast of the immense Pacific Ocean. The commencement of our colonial ship-building was attended with considerable difficulties, arising not more from the scarcity of shipwrights and materials, than from the want of a knowledge and proper management of the piculiar wood of this country. But experience and a due attention to the process of seasoning the timber has now proved that ships built of this country's wood are more durable than those vessels constructed in the mother country; and we are enabled to state, upon the authority of Mr. Gray, a first-rate shipbuilder, that our gumtree wood, when properly seasoned, is preferable to English oak for the purpose of shipbuilding; whilst nature, in this colony, so far aids the shipwright in his labour, that there is no form or curve which may be required in the art of shipbuilding, either for transoms 'knees,' no lengths which may be wanted for masts or spars, that cannot be found spontane. ously growing in our forests,
