It is a pity, the gentlemen composing the acting committee of this Society, are not sufficiently careful—how they force an old man incapable of earning a livelihood, to beg or steal a precarious living if they have it in their power to afford relief. I hope the old man's story is not true. He was sentenced to three months hard labour in the House of Correction—the Chairman intimating the labour would be such as was fitting for, or such as he could do—this of course will be nothing. And when that period has expired, it would be but common charity that the old man be placed in some Asylum, or that the government allowed him a mess to subsist on, that he may not at the very advanced age he is, be driven again to starve or steal. There were two appeal cases tried, which were confirmed—Messrs. Winderay and Nicholls attended for their respective clients, and conducted their cases in a very able manner—the convictions were confirmed. I think the convicting magistrates should manifest extreme delicacy in the slightest interference in appeal cases from their Bench. There are probably many persons engaged in the offices of law practitioners, who have held their situations many years, and who would now be incapable of earning a subsistence for themselves and families, if thrown out of their present employment. We contend, therefore, that the rule would have been more justly applied, had it stated that after a certain date no persons who had been convicted, or convicts, with or without indulgence, should be engaged in or about the business of attorneys, solicitors, and proctors, except such as were engaged at the time, who had held their situations for some years, and were known to be of good character. We cannot bestow any praise on the liberality of the sentence, which because the services of those who are now become free can be dispensed with, and condemn them to be thrown upon the world in a state of destitution, and for want of subsistence probably, driving them into some nefarious transactions (which in all such cases requires us to look respectively, and not retrospectively. From what we know of the state of society in New South Wales, we feel assured that the rule of Court, as applied to individuals who have become free by servitude or pardon, will cause much ill-blood. We ever come back to our former position, that the peculiar constitution of society in the two penal colonies requires to be dealt with by a healing law.

Although we cannot reconcile ourselves to the whole of the foregoing observations, we cannot but admit that the principle of the article is founded on good and sound reason, and in perfect accordance with the British Constitution. We trust their Honors, the Judges, will revise the order.
