The Big River Murders.

Tun trial of the eleven men for the alleged massacre of the Blacks at the Big River, came on last Thursday, and occupied the Court until a late hour at night, when the case broke down for want of proof of the identity of the murdered men. A gentle-man, named Hobbs, was closely interrogated upon this point, but his evidence was far from sufficient to carry the case home to the prisoners. He proved that one of the murdered men was a very large and unusually sized body, but the features being in so decomposed a state, he could see no

trace so as to lead to identity. Here, then, we have another strong instance of the judgment and legal acquirements of Mr. Attorney General and his uble coadjutor, the Crown Solicitor. Here, by their want of foresight or knowledge. we have another damning proof of the wasteful expenditure of public money:numerous witnesses are brought from New England, a distance of upwards of 400 miles, at an expence of nearly £200, upon a case which a lawyer's errand boy, who had read the depositions, would have pronounced insufficient to hold water. ourselves had a conversation with a gentleman a few days before the trial, and from him we learned all the particulars of the matter; and we then predicted that the case would fail upon the point it did, and we were not deceived. Now, if we, who are not even attorneys, let alone Attorney-General or Crown Solicitor, could have seen that the case could not be carried far enough (although far enough to go to a Jury) to convict the parties, we think it rather curious that our great Law Officers quotations. Constructions of the Law.

By a late English report we find that an application was made before Lord Denman, Chief Justice of the Court of Queen's Bench to restrain an attorney from employing in his office a person who had been formerly transported for felony, but had become free by servitude. The learned Judge delivered his judgment, that the application was one, the most novel and extraordinary, and that neither himself nor all the judges put together had any power to make such an order. How far that decision may appear consistent with the rules of our Supreme Court in this respect, we leave the learned in the law to

In touching this matter, we take an opportunity of subjoining the following renarks, which we copy from a public journal

on the subject of that rule :—

"In a country constituted like New South Wales, it is natural to suppose that this rule of Court will cause much ill-feeling and bickering; and on consulting the charter of New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land and the acts of parliament quoted by the Sydney Judges, we cannot discover that the Supreme Court of the Colony has any controul over the clerks, writers, and assistants of attornies, solicitors, and proctors. The Sydney Judges reason by analogy, from the employers to their servants, whereas it appears to us that the law ought to be strictly construed, attornies themselves ought to be persons of strict integrity, of education and ibility; and, as has been before stated, the Judges are by the charter of justice restrained from admitting any person to practice as such, who has been convicted of any offence which would prevent him from appearing in any of the Courts of Westminster; but we donot whether the law can without a forced construction be made to apply to persons employed as clerks and writers, although we admit that it is of the highest importance that the individuals whom he employs should be men of respectablity. The Chief Justice observed that the rule could not be attended with any private injury, but here we cannot coincide with him. On the contrary, we are rather disposed to believe that there are many instances in which positive individual injury would be committed by allowing the rule to act retrospectively.

William Joy, a very feeble old man, who appears to be a fit subject for an Asylum, was charged with stealing two blankets and a rug from the grounds of Mr. M'Arthur, to which charge he pleaded Guilty—stating in extenuation, that he had received for some time relief from the Parramatta Benevolent Society, and that a Mr. Staff had put him off the store of the Society, that he had not any thing to cover him, nor anything to eat; and he could not from extreme debility work to support himself. It is a pity, the gentlemen composing the acting committee of this Society, are not sufficiently careful how they force an old man incapable of carning a livelihood, to beg or steal a precarious living, if they have it in their power to afford relief. I hope the old man's story is not true. He was sentenced to three months hard labour in the House of Correction—the Chairman intimating the labour would be such as was fitting for, or such as he could do—this of course will be nothing. And when that period has expired, it would be but common charity that the old man be placed in some Asylum, or that the govern-ment allowed him a mess to subsist on, that he may not at the very advanced age he is, be
