

# English News.

## The New Post Office Act.

SINCE the "Act to provide for the conveyance and postage of Letters," has come into operation, individuals regularly receiving Magazines from the parent country, have had to pay dearly.

It was the custom formerly to charge but sixpence for a Magazine from England, received into our Post Office for delivery in Sydney; but now, the new Act will tend to impoverish the lovers of literature, by its adding two shillings extra upon such publications; —a pretty way of "raising the wind." The Post Office portion of the Revenue of the Colony, will increase most gloriously, if the importers of literary periodicals are determined to read, at any

The Schedule of the Act, says :- " For every letter or packet, not exceeding four ounces in weight, when put into the General Post Office, in Sydney, for delivery within the prescribed limits, including newspapers, two-pence." Now, it seems something strange that a packet, or mugazine, put into the Sydney Post Office, not exceeding four ounces, can be delivered within the prescribed limits of this metropolis for two-

two ounces, brought from on board an English ship, for Sydney delivery, should be charged two shillings and sixpence!

Surely the Act was never framed to tax so heavily such packets; the free delivery of which we trust our worthy Post Master tons, 11 packages furniture, 1 case oranges, 40 will speedily recommend in the proper quarter; for, tax such useful importations, and you will slacken the growth of the much desired taste for reading in our rising generation; which is supremely essential to the improvement of the morals of this important Colony. In fact, too much encouragement cannot be given by a wise government, to the importation, by a free postage, of periodicals, magazines, and newspapers.

Being lovers of consistency, we cannot admire the following regulation as regards Colonial newspapers; viz .- " For every newspaper printed in the Colony, if not put into any Post Office in New South Wales, for delivery at another, within seven days from the date thereof, at the rate of a single letter.'

We have no doubt but Mr. Raymond will see the necessity of immediately bringing to its pristine level, the amount of postage chargeable upon English periodicals. Without such a step being taken, literature must be clogged.

His Hornpipe was equal to the execution of a first-rate French dancing skipper on the "light fantastic toe;"—but the movement of the body should be seen and not heard, which, on account of the weakness, or heard, which, on account of the weakness, or want of energy on the part of the orchestra, the disagreeable stamps of the feet were perceptible to the remotest spectator. With a song, the music should be piano; but with a dance, it

should be forte forte.

On the whole, however, Mrs. T. never played with more spirit. Lee and Simes with their dranken revels—and "priming, load ing, and firing," in this piece, relieved the horror created in the minds of the audience by such a murderous representation. This is a piece we do not wish to dwell upon, and we trust it will

never again be presented.

THE BIG RIVER.—We have been favoured by Captain Butcher, late of the Abercrombie, with some account of the Big River, from which he has recently returned, having explored it to a distance of one hundred and twenty miles from the sea. Captain Butcher describes the river as navigable for vessel drawing nine feet water as far as Susan's Island, which is situated about eighty miles from the entrance. The banks of the river are thickly covered with timber, fit for building vessels of any description. At a place called Pine Reach about five miles above Susan's Island, Captain B. saw a great abundance of pine trees, greatly resembling the English pine, and well adapted or making spars or for similar purposes. Some of the trees Captain B. saw could not have been less than seven feet in diameter. The land on the banks of the river is generally of the finest description, and behind are extensive flats of fertile land, luxuriantly covered with grass, and fit for the immediate operation of the plough. Above Susan's Island the river is no longer navigable, in consequence of the interception of several falls, or rather bars, which obstruct the passage. The water is salt for some distance beyond Susan's Island, excepting in the rainy season. The banks of the river are generally pretty steep, the adjoining flats consequently do not seem to be subject to floods. About 38 miles from the entrance the river divides itself into two branches, the lesser one of which runs in an E.N.E. direction, and again unites itself to the main stream after making a detour of about 18 miles. The island thus formed of considerable extent, and the soil rich and fertile in the extreme. Beyond Susan's Island the river is only navigable for boats. Had time allowed, Captain Butcher intended to have folowed the channel to its source, which he imagines must be some 30 or 40 miles farther inland, as it was he was compelled to return without having completed his purpose. Considering the immense advantages that must accrue from the discovery so near us of extensive tracts of fertile land, adjoining a navigable stream, it certainly seems somewhat surprising that the Big River and other smaller streams to that the big River and other smaller streams to the northward of Port Macquarie, are known to us only through the medium of drunken sawyers. We do not think the time or the labour of an intelligent surveyor, with one of the Revenue Cutters placed at his disposal for a couple of months, would be alterether lest in couple of nonths, would be altogether lost in exploring the various navigable streams to their source.
