#### The "Black" Attachment.

COURT OF REQUESTS .- A contemporary, n alluding to this subject, gives his entire concurrence in the practice of demanding security where parties require time for payment of debts, and adds "that the Commissioner has no discretion, but that he must call for security in such cases." We, who have seen the Act of Council, and having seen it, consider ourselves perfectly competent to read it, could find no such clause throughout. Indeed it would be highly preposterous to suppose, that the Legislature would propose or enact a measure for the relief of poor persons, and at the same time render the remedy worse than the disease. When a provision was made to allow poor persons to pay debte by weekly or other instalments, it could not be expected that they could furnish security... All the world must know, that one friend would rather lend another fifty pounds, rather than become bail or security for as many shillings; and could any one for a moment suppose, that a poor person who cannot pay his debts, without being allowed to do so by weekly instalments, would be able to find any one ready or willing to enter into engagements for him. as security for his debts. If such an one could be found, we should consider him a fool or a madman. We, therefore, consider our contemporary, not only incorrect in his statements of the law, but also harsh and severe upon the poor debtor; for if time be allowed him by law, we think he ought certainly not to be called upon for that which it would be utterly impossible for him to procure, and the enforcement of such demand would therefore render the clause, intended for his relief, quite a dead letter. If time be given and he makes default, let an execution go against him, and that would be security enough even from the poorest man in the colony. If security should be called for, and the Commissioner think proper to enforce the same, is it not inconsistent, that such surety shall be received or not at the option or caprice of the plaintiff? Would it not be proper, that the Court should judge as to the competency of the proposed surety, as in cases of bail in our superior Courts? If any question or doubt should arise as to the ufficiency of the surety, let him be brought before the Commissioner and examined on oath as bail are when they justify themselves in open Court. Then it would be doing business as business ought to be done, but to let it remain with the plaintiff to decide as to whether he may or may not approve of the proposed security, is quite out of all reason. The great fault lays with our Wool Growers that they do not get better prices. It would be found avery profitable return to expend 1d. per lb. more labour in cleansing the fleeces-for there is every reason to belive that many samples of Woo', of the best fleeces, have not fetched so much by 6d, or even is, as they would have done, had this additional 1d. per lb. labour been expended in cleansing, before the Wool was forwarded to Sydney; on this subject, as well as on the markets we refer them to the following letters from J. For Sydney Wools of superior quality and good management, the prices are fully equal to those obtained in July, whilst a general disappointment was evinced at the ill-condition as to washing of many approved flocks, and an increased appearance of burrs and prickles through. out. (in many large flocks there was a large por-

tion of old sheeps' wool).

The Tasmanian flocks of repute show a shortness of staple, rendering them almost useless to the Combers, from whom alone a high price can be obtained for Van Diemen's Land Wool; and where the bales were suited to their use high prices were obtained. The beautiful growth of some Lambs' Wool from this Colony being suited to the existing demand, very high prices have been paid.

The Sales concluded with those of the Australian Company's and other flocks from Sydney, at which the biddings were very spirited, and he market has a firm and healthy tone.
