

the permanent resources of the empire, and for extending the influence and civilisation of Britain along with her race throughout the world. And I have little doubt that ere long, Government will feel compelled to adopt some measure, of this kind.

"I have been led to believe, from what fell from Lord Grey at the close of a long interview, that if a feasible plan for raising money on the security of the Crown Lands of Port Phillip for the purpose of emigration, and without the intervention of a Government guarantee, were laid before Government, that a proposition might perhaps be entertained. I have since then been engaged in negotiations on the subject, and I believe I shall be able in a few days, to lay before Earl Grey an offer of the loan of £100,000, on the sole security of the Crown Lands of Port Phillip.

"After the rejection of two former schemes for the promotion of Emigration to Port Phillip, I dare not be very sanguine of the success of this third one; but I feel that it is an object of such vital importance to the Province, that I shall leave no means untried for its accomplishment. I shall acquaint you with the fate of this proposal whenever I get an answer to it."

MONODY ON SIR GEORGE GIPPS, BY S. P. HILL.—The writer of these lines on the death of the late Governor, has appeared before the public on several occasions, as a composer of poetry; but this, his last effort, seems better than his former productions. We are not of those whose sentiments respecting the character of the late Sir George Gipps correspond with the writer's, but the present is no occasion to point out such differences of opinion; and indeed from anything that appears in the lines themselves, the sentiments of the writer are rather obscurely traced; the poetical language employed would equally apply to any other "sturdy oak, with gaunt pride," of the species man, as the subject of the author's monody; and it is only in the expressive note at foot, in humble prose, that we are allowed to discover the sentiments of the writer, where he states they were spontaneously effused in the verses "as a sincere tribute of respect to the memory of a good man and a talented statesman." Monodies, unless they are very well done, are but dreary, dismal things—and the only one we can remember reading with satisfaction, is Byron's, on poor Sheridan. We think Mr. Hill has used the poets license rather too freely in the following lines—

When crime rose red, and glared upon our sight,
He stay'd the plague, and saved us from its blight!
Spoke the loud word—extinguish'd the foul stain—
Slew Virtue's foe—and gave a purer name!
"BE FREE!" And, lo! Australia stands at last,
Unmanacled—unfettered—and unsurpass'd!

The share that Sir George Gipps had in the cessation of Transportation, was very trifling; and as to his wish for freedom for the colony, the universal complaint against his policy was, if we have read our annals right, that he tried to make us all vassals to the Despots in Downing-street.

IRISH AND SCOTCH RELIEF FUND.—The proprietors of the Victoria Theatre are determined to commence the first night of the season with every claim on the good will of the benevolent. They purpose handing over the gross proceeds of the night, free of all deductions, to the Local Relief Fund, for the benefit of the starving Irish and Scotch in the mother country. The Theatre will open this evening, Saturday, on which occasion the performances will be "The Farmer's Story," and "Past Ten o'clock." For this praiseworthy effort on the part of the proprietors, to relieve the distresses of their fellow countrymen in Great Britain, they as well as the company deserve, as no doubt they will obtain, increased support during the ensuing season. The Theatre will, we hope, be well attended this evening, and the receipts prove a valuable addition to the Relief Fund.

PETTY SESSIONS BEYOND THE BOUNDARIES.—His Excellency the Governor has appointed Mr. Cornelius De Witt Jebb, to be Clerk of Petty Sessions at Deniliquin; and Mr. William E. Murray, to be Clerk of Petty Sessions at Bombala.

DEPASTURING LICENSES AND ASSESSMENT ON STOCK.—Considerable sums being still due to the Government for Depasturing Licenses, and for arrears of Assessment on Stock pastured on Crown Lands beyond the boundaries of location, his Excellency the Governor directs it to be intimated to all persons thus in default, that unless they forthwith pay up all arrears and take out licenses for the runs they occupy, the Government will be reluctantly compelled to proceed for penalties, and to dispossess them, under the Act of Parliament 9 and 10 Victoria, cap. 104. And all parties thus in arrears are reminded, that under the proposed Order in Council, the licensed occupants of Crown Lands, at the time the same may come into effect, will alone be entitled to demand or obtain without competition leases of their runs.

SCOTS CHURCH, MACQUARIE STREET.—The Rev. Thomas Mowbray, minister of this church, who has been for some time laboring under an affection of the chest, has been compelled to resign his charge. On Sunday last, after a very appropriate sermon which was preached by the Rev. R. Mansfield, he entered the pulpit and delivered his farewell address to the congregation—an address which will long be remembered with feelings of deep and painful interest. In Mr. Mowbray's retirement from ministerial duty, the congregation have lost an able, zealous, and affectionate friend and minister, and the Presbyterian Church one of her brightest ornaments. On Monday evening the members of the congregation met in the church to accept his resignation, and to make arrangements for presenting him with a substantial testimonial of their affection and esteem. Subscriptions amounting to £280 were at once obtained, although not one half of the congregation were present. This worthy minister who has been only two years and a half in Sydney, will long be remembered by all who knew him.

SNOW STORM.—On Thursday, July 1. the neighbourhood of Mount Macedon was visited with a severe snow storm, the wind blowing fiercely, which continued without intermission until Friday morning, when the ground was covered with eight inches of snow, and is reported to have been between two and three feet in depth on the mountain, and at its base sheep were obliged to be kept in their folds until about noon on Friday, when the rain (which commenced in the morning) caused the snow to thaw very rapidly, and the grass to make its appearance. The trees in the Black Forest, and around the mountain as far as the storm reached, have got a complete lopping of a great portion of their branches, and many trees have been brought to the ground from the great weight of snow which they were supporting. The Mimosa trees, in particular, from their great number of branches and quantity of leaves, have been almost entirely broken down or levelled with the ground. The creeks have risen rapidly from the melting of the snow, together with the rain that has fallen: but if the rain does not continue, they will soon fall off again.—*Melbourne Argus.*

THE BUNYIP AT LAST!—A friend of ours has just received a letter from a gentleman, dated Mount Gambier, 5th July, in which he adds as a P.S. the following:—"I must mention to you a piece of information for naturalists which I have had from Mr. Scott, of the Glenelg, which is, that the overseer's wife at Mr. Blair's station on the Glenelg (Mrs. Burns) has lately, while employed on the banks of the river washing, seen on several occasions an immense animal as large, or larger, than a bullock rise up on the surface of the water, and extend two enormous flappers. The head, which was round, and a great part of its body were visible. The animal was at no great distance, and did not seem to shew much fear on being looked at. This is doubtless the far-famed Bunyip. The animal shewed daily as the river rose."—*Port Phillip Herald.*
