Gentlemen,—Allow me to thank you for the honour you have done me by requesting me to become a candidate at the forthcoming election for a member to represent your interests in the City Council.

In reply, I beg to inform you that I cheerfully place my humble abilities at your disposal, and in the event of being elected, I pledge myself to use my best endeavours to benefit my fellow-citizens.

Engagements made before I received your requisition, and which I cannot now postpone, will not admit of my being present on the day of election, and I therefore place myself in your hands—relying upon your pledge to use your best exertions to secure my return; but in the meantime as I may not have the opportunity of personally waiting upon every elector in the Ward, I think it right to express my opinion on the more important subjects now before the public.

I consider the subject of underground draining of paramount importance, and I am of opinion that the borrowing money on the corporate revenue is the only means of effecting this desirable object, whereby posterity would share the expense and the advantages accruing therefrom. I would also vote for a water rate, more with a view to the health, comfort, and cleanliness of the city, than with a view to revenue from this source, being fully alive to the importance of having the water laid along every street in the city where practicable, and supplied to the citizens at as cheap a rate as possible.

With regard to the lighting question, I could wish to see the whole city well lighted, but until such time as gas mains are laid throughout every Ward of the city, there does appear to me some difficulty to assess (according to the provisions of the Act of Incorporation), the whole of the property within the city "by a just and equitable assessment."
