BURNING OF THE "MADRAS" TRANSPORT SHIP OFF DEFTFORD DOCKYARD—On Tuesday

BURNING OF THE "MADRAS" TRANSPORT SHIP OFF DEPTFORD DOCKYARD —On Tuesday morning, at two o'clock, the barque Madras, 331 tons register, an old vessel, built at Whitehaven in 1827, since which time she has been kept in repair by her master and owner (Capt. Kitchen), was discovered to be on fire whilst moored off the Government Dockyard, at Deptford. The flames are supposed to have originated by combustion among the miscellaneous Government stores, of which there were eighty tons on board for Ascension Island. Sir John Hill, the captain-superintendent of the dockyard, immediately ordered the large floating engine to be taken alongside the burning vessel, manned by fifty Royal Marines and fifty policemen and labourers: but although the hold was inundated with water, the flames were so overpowering, that it was deemed the hold was inundated with water, the flames were so overpowering, that it was deemed prudent to haul her into the middle of the river, so as to scuttle her. In doing this, she unfortunately broke away, and drifted athwart the General Steam Navigation Company's steamers at Deptford, and a host of Dutch galliots. The confusion and alarm then became double, and several poor Dutch seamen fell overboard and were nearly drowned, as was the case with a few of the marines, by fulling from the engine. At length she was falling from the engine. At length she was ecurely scuttled in shallow water, and necesccurely scuttled in shallow water, and necessary arrangements have been made to raise her by chain lighters, her depth being at high water four fathoms, right abreast of the Watergate, Deptford. Mr. Somes, the extensive shipowner, was at first wrongly reported to be her owner, but she wholly belongs to Captain Kitchen, who was to have resigned the command of his barque to Mr. Bagley, long the chief officer. The Madras is fully insured in one of the London offices; a partial loss will, however, under the circumstances of the case, fall on the owner.—Observer, July 14.

COLONIAL EXPORTS.

TALLOW AND BEEF.—The following observa-tions from a London correspondent on these two commodities, the one of which has disappointed commodities, the one of which has disappointed expectation as greatly as the other has gratified the colonists, cannot fail to be read with interest, and we beg to draw particular attention to the favour in which our tallow stands, in consequence of the reliance placed in there being no false packing—that is, various qualities in the same package. Above all things our endeavour ought to be to maintain this good name, by rigid adherence to the same correct system, a deviation from which by adulteration of the article, we lately noticed in the London papers had been visited on the shippers from other countries, by a very material reduction in the value of the article.

In regard to our beef, we should not be de-terred alvogether by the first results, at the same time, even with the improvement which experitime, even with the improvement which experience will bring about, we ought not to be sanguine of finding a profitable market in England, where they receive supplies from so many where they receive supplies from so many sources nearer than ours, and possessing advantages beyond those we command; but we ought to be able to supply all the eastward of the Cape of Good Hope, and thus render unnecessary the transport of this class of provisions from Europe and America to these quarters of the globe.

We may here mention that some beef taken from Port l'hillip to Ceylon was very highly appreciated there by the planters, and being of picked quality, realised, without difficulty, the high price of six guineas the tierce.

A great error in former curings was that of salting down quantities of cattle that were otherwise unfit for sale, and rejected by the butchers; no wonder that at home such beef should be designated lean. Nothing but the very best meat should be salted.

Tallow from New South Wales is in good estimation with the dealers here, and the large quantities which continue to arrive sell readily at good prices, in comparison with the other descriptions which are brought to this market. The best kind, of good colour and strong hard body, sells at a better price by 9d. or 1s. per cwt. than the Russian tallow; but with the lower qualities the South American comes into competition and keeps down the price—the import of inferior quality from thence being very considerable. One quality only should be put in each package, as where two or more sorts are mixed the sample is often drawn from the inferior end, and thus the value of the better quality is lost; whilst, if the package is purchased by the better quality it leads to disappointment with the buyer, and creates a suspicion that the package was made up intentionally to deceive, and produces a creates a suspicion that the package was made up intentionally to deceive, and produces a prejudice against the article amongst the buyers. The tallow hitherto received has been very regularly packed, and this gives it a good reputation in the trade, which it is to be hoped the colonists will be studious to maintain. It is brought to sale by public auction, and a great deal of it is purchased by candle-makers in a small way of business; as a good many of these parties attend the sales the highest price of the market is generally obtained, for the competition is pretty keen amongst them, and they will not let a lot go anything under its value to a rival in trade. its value to a rival in trade.

The casks in which the colonial tallow is packed are objectionable, owing to the irregupacked are objectionable, owing to the irregularity of their size—some containing only two or three cwt., whilst others weigh a ton. This should be avoided if possible, for it occasions a great deal of trouble in ascertaining the tares, and also some additional expense; for when the casks are so irregular in size a great many have to be emptied out, in order to determine the actual tares; whereas, if the parcel were in even sized casks it would only be necessary to turn out two or three of them for that purin even sized casks it would only be necessary to turn out two or three of them for that purpose. It would save trouble if the casks were correctly weighed before the tallow is put in, and the tare scored on the head; for though the cask would absorb some of the tallow on the voyage home, and thus be some few pounds heavier than when weighed in the colony, allowance could be made for that, and the processity of emptying out as many to ascertain nccessity of emptying out so many to ascertain the proper tares would be obviated, if it were found the colonial tares could be depended upon. It is much better to score the tare on the casks than to mark it with ink or paint,

the casks than to mark it with ink or paint, for such a mark often gets rubbed out, or obliterated, on so long a voyage.

The duty on colonial tallow is only 3d. per cwt, whilst all foreign pays a duty of 3s. 2d. per cwt.; so that the nett proceeds of colonial yield £3 per ton more than is obtained by the foreign producer, which is a great deal in your

SALTED BEEF continues to arrive in large quantities, by almost every vessel, and is nearly unsaleable at any price. Much of it is apparently packed in old beer casks, which turn the pickle sour, and the meat of a dark colour; the meat itself is too lean for this market, and | S what fat there is on it is of a soft flabby nature, not hard as it should be; much of it has also not hard as it should be; much of it has also a very yellow or rusty appearance, not merely on the outside, but it is found to be in the same state all through when cut. It seems very doubtful if the colonists will ever be able to carry on an advantageous trade in salt provisions with this country: for the distance being so great they come to market under considerable disadvantage, as compared with Irish, Hambro', and American importations for ships' stores; and it does not appear that, even with the less fastidious lower orders of the town population, it can be brought into contown population, it can be brought into consumption, as no purchasers can be found for the very considerable parcels now lying in the Dock warehouses.

Some parties are having the meat brushed up and put into fresh pickle, at an expense of about four shillings per tierce, and hold their consignments in the hope of an improving market; but as much that has come to hand is is doubtful that any portion of the present arrivals will sell at a future period better than now. Were there more fat on the meat our soap boilers would have become purchasers at a price, but it is altogether too lean for their purposes, and it has not been thought worth their while even at the low rates at which it is offered.

It is lamentable to find that so much originally excellent meat has thus been wasted, and that after all the trouble taken on your side, the shippers of beef will have nothing for their eatile, and in most cases be brought in debt for their extracts incurred.
