Letters of Robert Salsbury - MS 210 /item 1/letter 1/1-4, 1871

Transcription Explanatory Notes:

Spottiswoode 29th Dec 1871

Dear Father

I wrote to you last month and to Ambrose this I could not write as I promised on [account] of it being our busy time and my overseer not being well, brought the work heavy on me. However I have done shearing and half of my work is now in the market, and I am in good hopes it will sell well this year. This is the first year that begins to give me a clear return for the last <u>nine years work</u> – for that space of time it was a hard struggle with [illegible] my only profit was the increase of my sheap [sic] – by other recourses of making money – I always laid out in <u>stock</u>, <u>horses & cattle</u> – And until this year on [account] of the low price of wool it took it all nearly to pay expenses of the working of my

station(s) but now wool as rose to every man its old price-it will leave a good margin of profit, and now I do not intend to buy any more stock, but to let what I have

increase to a certain amount and then sell off every year any that I have over the amount I intend to keep. I have just completed an arrange=ment with the Government for 21 years lease on this station with the right of purchase of the whole or part for 5/ (five shillings) per acre – at any time during the 21 years – this arrange=ment makes the station much more valuable as in the event of my selling it I have the right to transfer all my privileges to whomsoever I sell it. I am just preparing to go down to Town for my 12 months supplies and after that when the cool weather sets in I intend to take Marion and children down and will then send you there likenesses. This promise depends greatly on my better half for she as had so much roaming about with me – that she almost dreads leaving home even for a few weeks. I am very much disappointed About this last mail ship having gone down – of course (ere) this you have heard of it I was in hopes to have a letter from

Mother or [Rodie]however if they did write I hope they will do so again for by all accounts the mail will be completely destroyed even should they recover it. I have not received any newspapers from you yes, tell me have you ever got any from me.

I have sent you in all five. There is bitter complaints out here about the newspapers not one in three ever coming to hand. The letters you say you wrote jointly to Charles and me did you address them to him at the Porcupine Hotel. I have wrote to Charles and also to the Postmaster but as yet have received no reply but expect to hear next mail – but I told him how anxious you were to hear from him and I think he will at once write to you. The fact of him and I not keeping up a correspondence, you must not blame him for that, it was my fault for after parting with him in cold Bendigo [ill.34] I never write to him ill/34 like about 4 years ago when he did not reply to it for nearly a year and a half – but as soon as I hear from him I will let you know.

And I am anxious now to find him for should the world not have gone smooth with him you can depend Father I will do what a Brother [aught] to do, if he chooses to write to me. I send you by this mail also the ups & downs of my life out here – dates I cannot send – as I write from recollection, but you can depend on it being correct many things you may see to blame me for but hope you will make allowance for my [-] perceive of the world. And I can assure you when I came to this colony everything seemed to be up side down to what it was at home. Is Mothers mother alive. If so give her my love and tell her I do not forget my boyish days when I lived with her. Ask Mother to send me her likeness. I would like to have one of all my sisters if possible if you have any of Augusta's please let me have one. I

have wrote to Emily and hope to get an answer soon. Marion sends her love to you, and begs me to state you need never fear now but what you will hear regularly from us – So with kind love to yourself, mother and all the rest Beleive me
